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SECTION I
INTRODUCTION

Operation IMPACT, in its fifth year, provides direct support to the 17 counties upstate and on Long Island that account for 80% of the crime in the State outside of New York City. Operation IMPACT enables these counties and select jurisdictions to fight violent crime through innovative, intelligence-based policing strategies. The partnerships among agencies within all areas of law enforcement, enhanced information sharing, and the timely use of accurate crime data has transformed policing within the IMPACT jurisdictions. Operation IMPACT is more than just a crime reduction program: it has led to a paradigm shift in the way law enforcement works.

Operation IMPACT has four key critical components:

- **Active Partnerships**
- **Use of Timely and Accurate Crime Data**
- **Intelligence Development and Information Sharing**
- **Effective Strategies**

The effective combination of these four components has transformed Operation IMPACT from a crime reduction *program* into an innovative policing *philosophy* that has brought a variety of successes to the counties and jurisdictions that have embraced its full implementation during the last five years.

This section of the report reviews the four main components of Operation IMPACT, and describes the progression of each since the program's inception. In addition, IMPACT partners provided DCJS with year-end reports, and those reports are summarized in Section II, "IMPACT County Highlights", to illustrate how implementing these key components has led to successes within the IMPACT counties and jurisdictions.

Active Partnerships

When Operation IMPACT was first introduced to the counties and jurisdictions selected to participate in early 2004, District Attorneys and Police Chiefs in the 17 IMPACT counties and primary law enforcement jurisdictions¹ were asked to create formal partnerships consisting of local, county, State, and federal law enforcement agencies. These partnerships, or "consortiums" as they were first known, were asked to work closely together to develop an IMPACT strategy that would target the reduction of Part 1 crime² in the primary jurisdiction. Each participating agency offered its own unique area of expertise, with an eye toward enhancing the effectiveness of operations and reducing duplication of efforts and wasted resources. The partnerships were asked to meet regularly to ensure that all agencies would remain focused on the crime-reduction goal.

¹ The Primary IMPACT jurisdictions are the jurisdictions that account for the largest volume of crime within their respective counties (e.g., Rochester in Monroe County).

² Part 1 Crime is the crime that is reported by all law enforcement agencies under the Uniform Crime Reporting statute. The Part 1 Crimes also referred to as Index Crimes, are the Violent Crimes of Murder, Rape, Robbery, and Assault; and the Property Crimes of Burglary, Larceny, and Motor Vehicle Theft.

Early on, there was a certain amount of trepidation on the part of the Chiefs and District Attorneys. After all, they had worked with other law enforcement agencies before, but not with the purpose and formality that was expected through IMPACT, and there were doubts about the level of commitment that could be counted on by “outside” agencies.

Five years later, many IMPACT police chiefs tout the formal, active partnerships as the single-most effective component of Operation IMPACT. Enhanced collaboration between police and prosecution has led to stronger cases and tougher plea policies; the New York State Police partner with local departments for “blue and gray” patrols, warrant sweeps, and narcotics operations; IMPACT law enforcement agencies regularly conduct ride-alongs with probation and parole to enhance the supervision of chronic offenders and reduce recidivism; and, in 2008, a half-dozen IMPACT partnerships conducted Operation Rolling Thunder with the United States Marshal’s Services apprehending hundreds of fugitives from justice. IMPACT has sharpened the focus of its partner agencies, allowing them to concentrate on the same goal: ridding their communities of gun and violent crime.

Use of Timely and Accurate Crime Data

When Operation IMPACT began in 2004, crime analysis was an up-and-coming tool that was being used by very few IMPACT jurisdictions. DCJS wanted to change this. The partnerships were asked to make a concerted effort to submit their crime statistics on time each month, a requirement that had been problematic for some law enforcement agencies, and to make sure that the information that was being reported was complete and accurate. They were asked to look at crime reporting as more than simply a mandate; rather, to see it as the basis for a tremendous amount of information that, when analyzed and used properly, could completely change the way they made tactical and resource deployment decisions. The Operation IMPACT law enforcement agencies worked hard to accomplish this and in some instances, DCJS provided funding through the program to enhance their agency’s ability to report timely and accurate crime data. The chiefs of police started to see the benefit of this component of IMPACT as the reporting and review of accurate crime data began to enhance their knowledge of the crime within their jurisdiction.

By the second year of IMPACT, most of the primary jurisdictions had hired crime analysts and by the third year, IMPACT funding supported crime analysts in all 17 jurisdictions who work hand-in-hand with command staff to identify and analyze patterns and trends within their jurisdictions. Law enforcement administrators came to realize that the information provided to them by the crime analysts was not only eye-opening, it was allowing them to make more informed decisions about the tactical responses that should be used to address the crime trends. Currently, IMPACT supports thirty crime analyst positions. In approximately a half-dozen IMPACT jurisdictions, a research partner also conducts assessments of the effectiveness of certain strategies and provides the partnership with information on best practices pertinent to the unique crime problems being experienced within particular sites. IMPACT partnerships that do not have a research partner conduct their own assessment of the effectiveness of their strategies.

In 2008, the use of crime analysis reached a whole new level when DCJS, in partnership with 3 select IMPACT jurisdictions, created three Crime Analysis Centers in

Erie, Monroe and Onondaga counties. Each Crime Analysis Center (CAC) is run by a center director employed by DCJS and staffed by crime analysts supported by DCJS and the local IMPACT partner agencies. These three facilities provide law enforcement within the IMPACT jurisdictions and beyond with a centrally located unit responsible for conducting in-depth analysis of all of the county crime data. The CACs build upon the important partnerships developed through Operation IMPACT and expand the key philosophies of the initiative to all of the law enforcement agencies within those counties, further expanding the use of intelligence-led policing throughout the state.

In 2009, a fourth Crime Analysis Center will be established in Albany County. The Crime Analysis Centers will be discussed in more detail in Section III “State Agency Participation” of this report.

Intelligence Development and Information Sharing

In the third year of IMPACT, partnerships were encouraged to embrace intelligence gathering by creating the position of field intelligence officer to further enhance their intelligence-led policing strategies. The Field Intelligence Officer (FIO) is a non-traditional role within the police department who, under ideal circumstances, is dedicated solely to the task of intelligence development and dissemination. The FIOs conduct targeted debriefings of arrestees and other persons of interest, acting as the focal point for intelligence flow within the department and for information being received from sources outside the department. The most sophisticated Field Intelligence Programs direct their FIOs to work closely with the agency crime analyst and debrief based on current crime trends; this allows the FIO to be proactive, rather than reactive, in developing information about crime within their jurisdiction.

By 2008, IMPACT funding had enabled nearly all partner agencies to have a full time field intelligence officer, with forty-five full-time FIOs assigned in police departments, sheriff's offices, probation departments and even district attorney's offices. The IMPACT funded FIOs conduct debriefings of arrestees, jail inmates, gang members, probationers, parolees and various other individuals whom they determine may be able to provide valuable information that will assist their department in their crime-fighting efforts. The Field Intelligence Programs that have been developed during the last 3 years have become invaluable to the IMPACT partnerships as they continue to implement their crime reduction strategies.

Effective Strategies

Through the development and nurturing of active law enforcement partnerships, the use and analysis of timely, accurate crime data, and the cultivation and distribution of intelligence, the 17 IMPACT counties and primary jurisdictions have created effective strategies to address the crime problems that are unique to their jurisdictions.

IMPACT strategies are developed based on what an in-depth analysis of the crime within the primary IMPACT jurisdiction reveals. IMPACT strategies must incorporate the resources and contributions of all partner agencies and they must be multi-faceted, including

the following mandatory components: enforcement, prosecution, and community involvement. Other components that may be used in developing the IMPACT strategy include offender-based strategies, such as a focus on chronic offenders; environmental design strategies, such as improved lighting in high crime areas and addressing abandoned or vacant buildings; technology-based strategies such as the use of license plate readers or closed-circuit cameras in high crime areas; and victim-based strategies such as witness protection programs, outreach and education. Strategies should be fluid and able to be adjusted as crime conditions change. The partnership is required to assess their strategies to determine if they are effective or if they should be altered to address unmet needs.

Strategies are developed each year during the application process for IMPACT funding and are assessed throughout the contract period. All partner agencies are expected to contribute to the strategy development and offer resources to the effort, and they sign a Memorandum of Understanding outlining that commitment. The strategies that are submitted with the applications each year make clear that the 17 IMPACT partnerships now embrace the innovative components of the program as standard operating procedure within their departments.

SECTION II
IMPACT COUNTY HIGHLIGHTS

The following is a sampling, taken from the IMPACT county year-end reports, of the successes that various IMPACT partnerships have had with regard to adjusting their policing methods to embrace the key components of Operation IMPACT and in implementing the focused strategies developed by their respective partnerships. All 17 IMPACT Counties and primary law enforcement jurisdictions (noted in parenthesis) have had successes in 2008; this report highlights accomplishments in 12 of the 17 counties. Each of these highlights centers on one or more of the IMPACT components outlined in Section I of this report.

ALBANY COUNTY (Albany Police Department)

Juvenile crime and youth-related violence began to rise in the City of Albany in 2008. Crimes such as burglaries, vehicle break-ins, and assaults were becoming problematic, particularly in the hours immediately following dismissal from school. The Albany Police Department Information Coordination Unit, which is staffed by crime analysts and a field intelligence officer, analyzed the juvenile crime problem in order to develop a strategy to address it. This analysis determined that much of the violence was being committed by non-students, absentee students, and/or problematic students arriving at or near the school at dismissal time. The Albany Police Department command staff determined that the deliberate use of patrols in the areas surrounding the high school for several hours immediately following school dismissal was appropriate and warranted. Shortly after police implemented this strategy, the incidents of juvenile violence began to decline.

Crime analysis also showed that juvenile crime was problematic in other parts of the city. To address this problem, the Albany Police Department requested, and received, IMPACT funding for a full time youth aide to review cases of juveniles who have contacts with the Albany Police Department, identify the needs of juveniles and their families, and then provide appropriate referrals. The youth aide coordinates services and provides outreach to juveniles and their family, assisting them in enrolling in community-based programs, and conducts home visits to ensure that the needed services are being received. It is the goal of the Albany Police Department that these services and opportunities will give these juveniles alternative choices and deter them from criminal activity.

DUTCHESS COUNTY (City of Poughkeepsie Police Department)

In Dutchess County, the development of a field intelligence program was embraced by all partner agencies, and the program is now a thriving, integral component of the county's IMPACT strategy. The Dutchess Field Intelligence Group (DFIG) began in 2006 with FIOs from the City of Poughkeepsie Police Department, the Town of Poughkeepsie Police Department, the Dutchess County Sheriff's Office and the Dutchess County Probation Department. The assigned FIOs participated in the DCJS training "Tactical Debriefing for Field Intelligence Officers" and began meeting regularly to plot the course that their group would take toward becoming an essential component of the IMPACT strategy. Today, IMPACT crime analysts are formal members of the group, participate in all weekly meetings and interact with the FIOs every day.

Once the FIOs began to conduct targeted debriefings and distribute the information obtained from those debriefings, they began to see the results of their efforts. They aided

investigations and identified information on criminal activity that they had never had before within their jurisdictions. They became so committed to the ideal that they approached non-IMPACT agencies within Dutchess County to encourage them to join the group, and the DFIG now includes members from the Beacon, East Fishkill, Hyde Park police departments as well as other Dutchess County law enforcement agencies. The DFIG now works with law enforcement agencies outside the county, including several of the Orange, Ulster, and Westchester IMPACT jurisdictions; it is their hope to host a regional seminar in spring 2009 for all of the mid-Hudson IMPACT agencies in an effort to further broaden the interaction between the intelligence officers within this region of the state.

In 2008, targeted debriefings by the members of the DFIG and the broad dissemination of that information led to the identification and apprehension of five key members of a violent gang associated with the Cripps. The gang was responsible for numerous larcenies, burglaries, assaults and robberies in the City of Poughkeepsie and throughout the county. The investigation and subsequent arrests led to the recovery of more than a dozen firearms, a bulletproof vest, narcotics, stolen property and gang paraphernalia. The DFIG has been utilized to conduct targeted debriefings following several shooting incidents involving uncooperative victims. The intelligence that they were able to obtain led to investigators making arrests in those cases.

ERIE COUNTY (Buffalo Police Department)

The Erie County IMPACT partnership implemented a well-rounded, multi-faceted strategy, consisting of a variety of different initiatives to address crime within the city. One initiative, “Operation Triple Play”, involved an extensive drug investigation in South Buffalo that was spearheaded by the Buffalo Police Department Narcotics Intelligence and Vice Enforcement Bureau, with critical assistance from the other Erie County IMPACT partner agencies. An undercover decoy was used, informants were cultivated and debriefed, undercover narcotics purchases were made, and during the course of many months the cases were built. The execution of search warrants during a three-day period resulted in the apprehension of 31 suspects on 39 total indictment warrants, 13 arrests on other charges, and one juvenile arrest. In addition to the individuals apprehended, police seized a large amount of cash, six vehicles, recovered 15 firearms and guns, and confiscated 35 pounds of marijuana and 3 ¾ pounds of cocaine during the initiative.

The intelligence obtained through this initiative was used to develop a strategy for conducting a second initiative to continue to put pressure on the drug and gun trade within Buffalo. “Operation Third Strike”, which added the Drug Enforcement Administration’s Buffalo Task Force as a second lead agency, obtained information about the inner workings of a local drug network through a variety of electronic surveillances. This operation resulted in 29 indictments handed down and the arrest of 23 suspects when numerous IMPACT law enforcement agencies converged on locations to execute search warrants. Seven suspects now face life sentences under federal prosecution. This operation resulted in the seizure of more than \$100,000, six vehicles, 17 handguns, shotguns, and assault rifles, and various amounts of narcotics, including cocaine, marijuana, heroin, and prescription drugs. These two initiatives helped disable a notable portion of the drug trade in Buffalo and reduced the violent crime that goes hand-in-hand with illegal narcotics operations and guns.

MONROE COUNTY (Rochester Police Department)

The centerpiece of Monroe County's Operation IMPACT strategy is joint police patrol details in the City of Rochester by the Rochester Police Department, Monroe County Sheriff's Office, and New York State Police, which aim to reduce violent crime by deploying patrols focusing on when that crime occurs, where it occurs, and who is involved.

Through the Monroe Crime Analysis Center, crime analysts analyze trends to identify the peak hours, days of week, and weeks of the year in which violent crime is historically the highest. Command staff then deploys the joint patrols when violent crime is at its worst. In addition to understanding when violence is occurring, analysts work daily with command staff to identify geographic hotspots of violence and deploy the IMPACT patrols to the areas of the city with the highest historical concentrations of violence. Finally, officers that conduct the joint patrols are given specific information about the crime problems and conditions in the areas to which they are assigned allowing the patrols to address the unique violent crime problems in each area. The Monroe County Probation Department supplements the joint patrol efforts, which greatly enhances the ability of the patrols to access individuals on probation suspected of participating in targeted criminal activities.

In 2008, the Rochester Police Department conducted joint patrol details five times from May through October 2008. In a comparison of the time periods in 2008 when details were conducted and the same time periods in 2007, a notable reduction in violent crime was seen in three of the five detail periods. An overall reduction of 11.8% in violent crime was realized during the five separate periods combined. This data suggests that the joint patrols enabled through IMPACT funding are associated with some notable year-to-year decreases in violent crime.

In addition to successful police enforcement initiatives, the Monroe County IMPACT partnership employs a successful prosecution component to their strategy. In order to send a clear message to the criminal element being targeted, the District Attorney's Office has put several internal policies in place: the office severely restricts charge reductions for violent felony defendants; has expanded the use of grand juries to swiftly indict defendants charged with serious crimes; and has consistently advocated that violent offenders receive the maximum sentences allowable under New York's laws. The Monroe County District Attorney's Office also works closely with the United States Attorney's Office to refer for federal prosecution those individuals that, when prosecuted federally, might face stiffer penalties for their crimes than they might receive in state court. Thirty-seven defendants were referred to the U.S. Attorney's Office for prosecution during the first nine months of 2008.

NASSAU COUNTY (Nassau County Police Department)

In Nassau County, the IMPACT funded Lead Development Center (LDC) has played a pivotal role in nearly every Nassau County criminal investigation. The LDC provides the Nassau County Police Department, as well as the approximately 16 additional law enforcement agencies within the county, with a central location for intelligence to be gathered and distributed. The LDC draws intelligence from a variety of different law

enforcement databases in addition to intelligence provided to the center directly from the law enforcement agencies in Nassau County.

Numerous cases have been enhanced by the sharing of information and intelligence housed at the LDC and the dissemination of that information during the monthly analyst meeting. At one such meeting, the Third Precinct representative communicated a series of incidents where an unknown subject was approaching delicatessens and restaurants purporting to be from a local church. He would tell the business owners that he was organizing a charity event and inquired if the business would be interested in catering the event. When the business expressed the desire to prepare the food, the subject would then place an order and ask for a cash donation up front for operating expenses in lieu of a discount for the charity event. The scam was uncovered when one business owner became aware that the subject had no connection to the church and the church informed the business owner that there was no such charity event scheduled. Through the information gathered at this meeting, it was determined that this subject had been involved in multiple scams in numerous locations. The Port Washington Police Department, which was not aware of any incidents at the time of the meeting, discovered that this individual was involved in their jurisdiction and uncovered a video of the subject that was given to the LDC. The LDC then disseminated an intelligence bulletin with the subject's photograph from the video to agencies within Nassau County. Through the Nassau County Police Department's Public Information Office, the actual video of the subject was distributed to the news media which resulted in many new reports from businesses that had been approached or scammed out of money. In addition, prior to the news release, the Port Washington Police had been notified (within hours of the distribution of the intelligence bulletin) that the fifth precinct had conducted a field intelligence report on this subject. It was then that they were able to identify the individual wanted for these charity scams.

Through the widespread distribution of this intelligence, and the information links that it created, the offender was arrested on the felony charge of scheme to defraud in the 1st degree, instead of the misdemeanor (scheme to defraud in the 2nd degree) he had originally been charged with.

ONEIDA COUNTY (Utica Police Department)

Operation Rolling Thunder, an enhanced, targeted warrant initiative, was implemented in several of the IMPACT jurisdictions in 2008 and the Oneida County partnership had a particularly successful operation. During two days in May 2008, the Utica Police Department, the secondary IMPACT jurisdiction³ of the New Hartford Police Department, the Oneida County Sheriff's Office, the Oneida County Probation Department, the New York State Police, and New York State Division of Parole worked closely with the United States Marshal's Service to serve some of their most serious warrants and apprehend some of their most wanted criminals. Operation Rolling Thunder resulted in the apprehension of 106 individuals in the city of Utica on a variety of warrants. The warrant

³ Secondary IMPACT jurisdictions are jurisdictions within an IMPACT county that are determined by the partnership, led by the District Attorney and the Chief of Police of the primary jurisdiction as Co-Chairs, as being in need of IMPACT resources. They are full partners in the IMPACT strategy.

team made 13 felony arrests; 52 misdemeanor arrests; 13 probation-warrant arrests; 14 violation arrests; and 2 sex offender arrests. Six arrest warrants were also issued out of Oneida County Family Court.

ONONDAGA COUNTY (Syracuse Police Department)

In Onondaga County, a variety of strategies are employed to meet the IMPACT goal of reducing Part 1 Crime. The Onondaga County partnership is fluid in its use of, and adjustments to, existing strategies and in the development of new strategies.

One new strategy, Chronic Offender Recognition and Enforcement (CORE), was born as a result of the DCJS-hosted Operation IMPACT Conference in Saratoga Springs in January 2008. Members of the Rochester Police Department conducted a presentation on their chronic offender program, known as VEST (Violent Enforcement and Suppression Team) and described the success that they have had with this offender-based strategy. Impressed by the concept, members of the Syracuse Police Department that attended the conference approached the Onondaga IMPACT Executive Committee (made up of representatives from all of the county IMPACT partner agencies) about mirroring the initiative in their jurisdiction. After four months and numerous meetings, the Onondaga IMPACT partnership began to implement CORE.

Through CORE, Onondaga County law enforcement executives seek to reduce the number of violent crimes committed in the city of Syracuse by ensuring that chronic offenders, who often commit a disproportionate amount of violent crime in a jurisdiction, are held accountable in the criminal justice system. The IMPACT partners used specific and objective, data-led criteria to identify individuals who should be targeted through the CORE strategy and brought together all of their available resources in order to enhance the investigation, prosecution and supervision of these chronic offenders. The Syracuse Police Department has assumed a leadership role in this initiative, but CORE's success depends on a collaborative effort among many agencies including the Onondaga County District Attorney's Office, Sheriff's Office and Probation Department, the New York State Police, the New York State Division of Parole, the United States Marshals Service, the Drug Enforcement Administration, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms, the United States Attorney's Office, and the John F. Finn Institute for Public Safety which has provided analytical services for this initiative.

All of the original twenty-six chronic offenders who were on the CORE list have been arrested (some multiple times) as part of the initiative. Ten received state prison sentences ranging from one to seven years; 8 were sentenced to the local county correctional facility; and 8 still have charges pending. In addition, the United States Attorney's Office has indicted one of the 10 defendants serving state prison time on federal charges. CORE is a fluid law enforcement strategy, so a new list was compiled last month using the same criteria that was established by the partnership for the first. Twenty-one individuals are currently being targeted through this chronic offender strategy.

ORANGE COUNTY (City of Newburgh Police Department)

Prosecution is an important piece of the overall effectiveness of the IMPACT strategy. In Orange County, the District Attorney's Office is working to reduce the prevalence of illegal guns on the streets and reduce the open-air drug trade in the primary IMPACT jurisdiction of the City of Newburgh. IMPACT funds a full-time investigator with the District Attorney's Office who meets daily with the senior assistant district attorney assigned to the Newburgh office. The two review all of the Newburgh cases, ensure that victims and witnesses keep their appearances in court, and conduct enhanced investigations when a case needs strengthening. The investigator also meets daily with the field intelligence officers from the Orange County IMPACT partner agencies (including the city of Newburgh Police Department and the two secondary jurisdictions of the towns of Newburgh and New Windsor police departments, as well as the Orange County Sheriff's Office and Orange County Probation Department) and is responsible for coordinating the distribution of intelligence and information gathered by the team.

To further strengthen the prosecution strategy, the Orange County District Attorney enforces a "plea to the charge" policy on all narcotics sale cases and cases in which an undercover officer purchases narcotics. The office also flags specific IMPACT-related cases for enhanced prosecution. Cases are reviewed daily, and those that are gun related or involve "chronic offenders" (as determined by set, objective criteria) are referred for enhanced prosecution. The Orange County District Attorney's Office enhanced prosecution designation leads to very limited plea bargaining and a request for the maximum sentence allowed by law.

Finally, in response to the increase in juvenile crime in the City of Newburgh and in other Orange County jurisdictions, the Orange County District Attorney's Office works closely with the County Attorney's Office which is responsible for handling all juvenile criminal cases, to hold parents responsible for appropriately supervising the juvenile offenders and ensuring that they obey all of the conditions of their probation or release. Parents who do not provide appropriate supervision to their minor children involved in the Family Court system face endangering the welfare of a child charges. There also are harsh penalties pursued against any adult offender who solicits juveniles to commit criminal activities.

RENSSELAER COUNTY (Troy Police Department)

In the city of Troy, analysis conducted in the early stages of the IMPACT initiative uncovered that at least half of all of the violent crime committed in the city is either directly or indirectly related to the drug trade. An example of direct involvement is a shooting that occurred as the result of a drug deal that resulted in a violent dispute. An example of indirect involvement is property stolen during a larceny and/or burglary that is later discovered at a drug sale location, leaving officers to conclude that the stolen items were traded for narcotics. As a result of this analysis, the Special Operations Section (SOS) of the Troy Police Department, a unit dedicated to narcotics, has always taken a lead role in implementing the Rensselaer County IMPACT strategy.

In 2008, multi-disciplinary teams of officers from a variety of law enforcement agencies including the Troy Police Department SOS, Community Policing Unit, and Traffic Unit; the Rensselaer County Sheriff's and District Attorney's Offices and Probation Department; New York State Police and Parole; and federal Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms and Drug Enforcement Administration met each week to work on directed anti-crime initiatives in Troy. At least once a week, 20-member details conduct proactive operations in the city of Troy's highest crime areas to address violent crime and quality of life issues that erode the confidence that residents have in their communities. These teams made approximately 800 arrests in 2008, accounting for about 20% of all of the Troy Police Department arrests. These multi-agency teams are directly responsible for the seizure of three-quarters of a pound of crack cocaine; 65 pounds of marijuana; \$52,000; 3 vehicles; 10 firearms; and executing 45 search warrants. The chief of the Troy Police Department characterizes Operation IMPACT as "a force multiplier for our department" because IMPACT funding allowed these operations to be conducted without a burden on the local taxpayer.

SCHENECTADY COUNTY (Schenectady Police Department)

The Schenectady Office of Field Intelligence (OFI), and the partnership aspect of IMPACT, played a large part in the takedown of individuals that were responsible for as many as one hundred burglaries in a three-county region, including the IMPACT jurisdictions of Schenectady and Albany counties.

During the period of time when a notable spike in burglaries was occurring in Schenectady and surrounding jurisdictions, a Schenectady Police Department field intelligence officer obtained information, through a debriefing in an unrelated case, about an Xbox 360 that had been taken during a burglary and sold. The FIO identified the man who had sold it and flagged the individual as a person of interest. The FIO used the Schenectady OFI to distribute that information to the rest of the police department and other IMPACT agencies. The Schenectady Police Department then joined with five other police agencies that had an interest in the case, formed a task force and began the burglary investigation. Within a matter of weeks, the Schenectady Police Department announced that three men, who had been burglarizing homes in order to get money to feed their drug habits, had been arrested for the crimes. This case is an excellent illustration of the benefit of assigning Field Intelligence Officers to conduct debriefings of all arrestees to increase the chances that the department might be given information about criminal activity that is completely unrelated to the arrest at hand, providing opportunities to solve other unrelated cases.

SUFFOLK COUNTY (Suffolk County Police Department)

In Suffolk County, the IMPACT partnership has worked to reduce the level of gun violence within the county. IMPACT V funding allowed the Suffolk County partnership to enhance their ability to conduct gun investigations and improve their intelligence efforts. As a result, numerous intelligence-driven investigations in 2008 have led to the recovery of more than 850 crime guns, including a .357 caliber revolver that was used in the August, 2007 execution-style murders of three college-bound teenagers and the shooting of a fourth on a playground in Newark, N.J.

The investigation unfolded when the Suffolk County District Attorney's Gun Suppression Unit conducted an undercover sting operation at a tattoo parlor. IMPACT funding was used to purchase guns and drugs from various gang members and eventually an electronic surveillance operation was set up at the tattoo parlor. Upon execution of the sting operation, an IMPACT team of undercover investigators, district attorney investigators, Suffolk County probation officers, and Suffolk County police officers recovered more than 30 guns and obtained a warrant to search the residence of the owner of the tattoo shop, who is a known member of the Salvadorian street gang MS-13. There, authorities found 10 additional guns, a loaded, sawed-off 12-gauge shotgun, and the loaded .357 caliber revolver that was used in the Newark murders. The tattoo shop owner was indicted on multiple felonies by a Suffolk County grand jury.

WESTCHESTER COUNTY (Yonkers Police Department)

In 2008, the Westchester County District Attorney's Office held a Grand Opening of the Westchester Intelligence Center (WIC). The WIC, supported in part through Operation IMPACT funds, provides critical information coordination for the 43 local law enforcement agencies within Westchester County, as well as the state and federal law enforcement agencies that work in many of those jurisdictions. Information coordination and de-confliction services provided by the WIC ensure officer safety and avoid duplication of effort, both of which are crucial given the participation of multiple law enforcement agencies.

The WIC mirrors the IMPACT model of collaboration and information sharing among law enforcement and acts as the central hub of that coordination for Westchester County. The Westchester Intelligence Center illustrates the level at which the Westchester IMPACT partners have embraced and expanded the essential components of the IMPACT philosophy. The WIC houses crime analysts and field intelligence officers, some of whom are supported through IMPACT, who provide assistance and information to all Westchester County law enforcement agencies, IMPACT and otherwise. The WIC is currently working to create countywide connectivity among law enforcement agencies so that all Westchester County agencies will have access to a much broader base of data than currently available.

Under IMPACT V, the Westchester County District Attorney's Office requested, and was awarded, funding to allow the WIC to create a database that would contain important information from all of the Domestic Incident Reports (DIR) that are filed by Westchester County law enforcement agencies each year. The DIR database will replicate the coordination that the WIC currently provides on index crime data to include domestic violence data. Through the DIR database, a law enforcement agency in Westchester County responding to a call for service on a domestic case will have the ability to immediately determine if the perpetrator in the incident has had any other domestic incidents documented in the county in the past, providing important information that may lead to a clearer picture of the current situation. This database will enhance and improve the response to domestic violence among Westchester County law enforcement agencies and it will allow domestic violence data to be collected for analysis as well.

The number of police agencies that have requested information from the WIC is beginning to increase dramatically and the requests have extended far beyond the immediate

Westchester County area to include requests from as far south as Florida and as far west as Arizona.

Operation IMPACT – Key to our Communities

For the past five years, Operation IMPACT has provided critical funding for public safety in the 17 urban areas that need it the most. But the best IMPACT strategies also take into account that police presence, arrests, and successful prosecution alone won't make a community safe: police and communities must work together, employing effective strategies and embracing programs that provide young men and women with alternatives to gangs and crime, allowing residents to reclaim their neighborhoods.

The Request for Applications for IMPACT V funding mandated that a community component be incorporated into each IMPACT strategy. Community policing, which can include assigning officers to attend community meetings to enhance communication with residents, is employed by many IMPACT jurisdictions. This interaction improves the relationship between law enforcement and the community and it allows members of the police department to obtain critical information about criminal activity within their communities through the relationships that they develop. Several of the IMPACT jurisdictions also have community alert systems in place, such as Citizen Observer. These systems, which are web-based, allow residents to receive e-mails or text messages providing them with information about wanted people, crime patterns within various parts of their city, tips on how citizens can protect themselves from crime, and more. These systems also generally have a method for the subscribers to provide anonymous tips on crime or criminal activity to encourage the assistance of the community in crime fighting efforts. Other IMPACT strategies focus on reducing the “no snitch” mentality within their communities, while others have community components that involve outreach and education to the community – typically youth – on topics such as gangs.

Community components are important to a well-rounded, complete crime reduction strategy. Some of the Operation IMPACT jurisdictions are provided partial funding for a community component that compliments their overall crime reduction strategy. Some examples include:

- Oneida County IMPACT: JCTOD Outreach, Inc. is a community service organization located in the heart of Utica's Corn Hill neighborhood which is the main focus of the IMPACT strategy. This group works directly with the IMPACT partner agencies and provides numerous activities geared toward providing at-risk youth with alternatives to criminal behavior. Job fairs, youth olympics, basketball tournaments, and peace marches are just some of the activities that are hosted by JCTOD in an attempt to engage young people in their community.
- Monroe County IMPACT: Pathways to Peace, a program run by the city of Rochester, provides a variety of outreach services aimed at young people identified as at risk for involvement in street-level violence and gang activity. Through its support of the Strong Trauma Physicians Program, Pathways has referred victims of violent crime to support services, and has been a central contact for the Cease Fire program, which seeks to divert

gang members from participating in criminal activities. In addition, Pathways reaches out to at-risk youth to steer them toward job training, education, and other services.

- Albany County IMPACT: The Albany Police Department hired a youth aide through IMPACT V to review cases of juveniles who are arrested and to determine the needs of those individuals and their families in an effort to provide services designed to reduce the risk of recidivism of these young offenders. The Albany IMPACT partnership recognizes that there is also a need to address the social and economic nuances that prompt criminal activity.

Operation IMPACT – Critical to Continued Success in Jurisdictions

As stated earlier, during the past five years, Operation IMPACT has become much more than a crime reduction program in the counties that have implemented it: it has led to a change in the overall approach to policing. IMPACT funding provides agencies with the ability to purchase needed equipment; hire staff to enhance their ability to conduct crime analysis and develop intelligence; and provide “boots on the ground” for IMPACT-related details and operations, heightening the police presence in many jurisdictions.

Below is a sampling of some of the comments made by IMPACT partners in the 2008 year-end reports that were submitted to DCJS:

Many of the successes that our partnership has had “can only be achieved with the support of DCJS under Operation IMPACT.....The leadership the State provides to the local partners has given us insight into other initiatives that occur statewide and often we review these efforts for implementation on a similar level in Dutchess County. Funding for equipment and operations is key to our success.....”

“We realized many accomplishments in 2008 as a direct result of Operation IMPACT.....Clearly, IMPACT funding has made a dent in the drug trade and overall crime in the City of Troy. Without it, the Troy Police Department would be severely handicapped in fighting crime in the city of Troy.”

Continued funding of Operation IMPACT will ensure that counties and cities can continue to support critical public safety priorities in the face of economic uncertainty.

SECTION III
STATE AGENCY PARTICIPATION

NEW YORK STATE DIVISION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE SERVICES

The New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) is responsible for the management and administration of the Operation IMPACT initiative. The Division has assigned staff to work closely with the 17 IMPACT partnerships to assist them in implementing their strategies and to provide the IMPACT agencies with a single point of contact for all information and services provided to law enforcement by the Division. These IMPACT “ambassadors” attend all monthly IMPACT partnership meetings and provide follow-up in areas where a need is determined to exist; make referrals on training and other resources available through DCJS; and coordinate access to other New York State agency resources as needed. In addition, the IMPACT Unit staff closely monitors the performance measures that IMPACT agencies must meet as part of their participation in the program, including the timely submission of crime reports, the proper processing of recovered crime guns, use of SAFETNet⁴, proper reporting on sex offenders, and proper designation of arrests that have a Domestic Incident Report on file in conjunction with the arrest.

In January 2008, IMPACT Unit staff organized a two-day Operation IMPACT Conference hosted by the DCJS Commissioner that was attended by partners within all 17 IMPACT counties. The conference was designed to provide information on best practices in crime reduction methods and to provide a forum for our IMPACT partners to learn about successful crime-fighting strategies created by their colleagues in other jurisdictions. In keeping with past conferences, last year’s event was an overwhelming success, with many of the partnerships leaving with a broader range of knowledge about different initiatives that they could embrace in an effort to reduce their crime. In fact, some partnerships returned home and actually adopted strategies they learned at the conference (see the Onondaga County overview in Section II of this report as an example).

The DCJS Commissioner also created a Technical Assistance Team – the members of which have particular areas of expertise - to provide an intensive level of one-on-one assistance to IMPACT partner agencies. Two members of this team are retired law enforcement officials, one with an extensive investigative background, including serving as the commanding officer of a homicide squad in Queens; and the other with an impressive background in police administration, including as the deputy chief of the Rochester Police Department. Two other team members have expertise in crime analysis and information technology. In 2008, this team provided 298 days of on-site technical assistance to the 17 IMPACT counties and primary jurisdictions. In addition, they have developed and delivered specialized training classes pertinent to the needs of IMPACT jurisdictions, including:

- Major Crimes Series One – designed to help investigators and detectives hone their skills in conducting effective investigations on robberies; also includes role-playing to teach identification procedures and how to conduct effective line-ups.
- Major Crime Series Two – provides practical information to improve investigators and detectives skills on homicide cases, and includes information on shaken baby syndrome.

⁴ SAFETNet is New York State’s De-confliction System that is maintained by the New York State Intelligence Center (NYSIC). All IMPACT law enforcement agencies are required to enter all of their targets of open-active investigation into the SAFETNet system for both officer safety and efficiency.

- Officer Safety and Street Encounters – provided to uniformed officers to hone their tactical skills and legal knowledge of conducting stop and frisk activities.
- Tactical Debriefing for Field Intelligence Officers – focuses on best tactics to use to obtain valuable information from persons of interest and includes a day of role-playing during which class attendees conduct debriefings.
- Tactical and Operational Analysis using GIS (CMAP) – provided to crime analysts to enhance their crime mapping skills.
- Report Writing – designed to help officers hone their abilities to write effective police reports that will benefit both themselves and others.

In 2008, the commissioner's Technical Assistance Team conducted 47 different trainings in the IMPACT jurisdictions and provided instruction to 721 law enforcement officers and crime analysts. In addition to this training, the DCJS Office of Public Safety (OPS) provided free training to all law enforcement agencies throughout the State that is specifically geared toward identified needs within IMPACT jurisdictions.

Local Crime Analysis Centers

In 2008, DCJS established three Crime Analysis Centers (CACs) in collaboration with Operation IMPACT partners in Erie County (Buffalo), Monroe County (Rochester) and Onondaga County (Syracuse). A fourth CAC will be established and operational in Albany County (Albany) in 2009. These four locations were chosen for the CACs because of the high volume of crime reported in each IMPACT jurisdiction. A Board of Directors, which includes the district attorney, the chief of police in the city where the Centers are located, and other law enforcement officials in the jurisdiction, oversees each Crime Analysis Center. The board establishes the direction of the CAC based on the tactical, strategic, and administrative needs of the agencies that benefit from it.

The use of daily, accurate crime analysis is essential to effectively address crime, and the CACs take that ideal one step further by conducting analysis at a regional level. The CACs provide a centrally located unit for conducting in-depth analysis of all county crime data – often for the first time ever - allowing county law enforcement agencies to benefit from the information as never before. The centers' analysts use software programs that allow them to create linkages amongst all available data sources from the various agencies within the county. Crime incidents, people, telephone numbers, etc. from these various jurisdictions can be linked to determine criminal associations that can enhance investigations and solve cases. They also use mapping software that allows them to see a regional picture of where crime is being committed. These tools, combined with data drawn from numerous databases and records management systems from police departments in each of the respective CAC counties, is providing Center staff with a wealth of information to analyze in their quest to provide valuable data that will assist local law enforcement agencies in their crime reduction efforts.

The Crime Analysis Center initiative increases crime analyst staffing and provides state-of-the-art technology and training in order to provide more timely and accurate information to both executive and ground level personnel for the purpose of crime reduction and heightened officer safety.

The commanding officer of each of the three main CAC jurisdictions – Buffalo, Rochester, and Syracuse - and their administrative staff meet daily with their respective CAC director in order to determine any crime patterns that occurred in the previous 24 hours or more and make determinations about the deployment of resources in response to those patterns. This daily interaction allows these IMPACT jurisdictions to address crime patterns before they become crime trends.

According to Rochester Chief of Police David Moore, “The implementation of the Monroe Crime Analysis Center has greatly enhanced what the Rochester Police Department started in 2007 with our daily crime briefings. The ability to have information regarding crime trends and patterns within minutes allows us the ability to deploy personnel in a more productive and efficient manner.”

NEW YORK STATE POLICE

The New York State Police (NYSP) has played an invaluable role in providing resources and support to the 17 Operation IMPACT jurisdictions since the initiative began in 2004. Some of the NYSP activities within the IMPACT jurisdictions in 2008 are:

Troop A

The State Police assigned to this troop assist the City of Buffalo (Erie County IMPACT partnership) with IMPACT details. Generally, six uniformed troopers and a State Police sergeant are assigned to work in conjunction with the Buffalo Police Department Mobile Response Unit (MRU), a tactical response unit that uses daily crime analysis to determine where and when they will patrol. The team of troopers and Buffalo police officers worked four days a week through the summer, and Friday, Saturdays and Sundays during the colder winter months, as street crime tends to show a decline at that time. Since these details began in March 2008, troopers have made 455 arrests (106 felonies, 233 misdemeanors and 116 violations); executed 166 arrest warrants, recovered 8 guns, 4 other weapons and made 188 drug interdiction arrests.

Consider this significant investigation conducted by IMPACT troopers working with the Buffalo MRU: On Nov.11, 2008, troopers initiated a traffic stop as a part of an MRU IMPACT detail in Buffalo. Through their investigation at the scene, they arrested three individuals for illegally possessing two handguns. Ballistics tests later revealed that one of the guns was involved in two shootings and a robbery that had occurred in Buffalo.

Troop D

On August 2, 2008, Trooper Nathaniel Phelps was working an Operation IMPACT detail in Syracuse. During the tour, 9-1-1 issued an officer safety bulletin regarding a white Chevy Malibu that possibly contained burglary proceeds, including a .38 caliber revolver. Trooper Phelps entered the vehicle information in his patrol vehicle’s license plate reader, which later identified the vehicle. Trooper Phelps stopped the car with its five occupants. With the assistance of backup units, the vehicle was searched and Trooper Phelps found a loaded Browning .22 caliber semi-automatic pistol hidden in the engine compartment next to the battery. The 20-year-old female owner of the vehicle admitted that she had put the

handgun there, saying that she was trying to sell it on the street and had hid it under the hood because she had heard police never search there. She was arrested for second-degree criminal possession of a weapon, and also confessed to stealing a small safe containing jewelry from her mother's house. Although the suspect did not disclose what happened to her mother's .38 caliber revolver, this incident illustrates the value of sharing information and also how license plate readers have become an important piece of technology regularly used in IMPACT details.

Troop E

On Oct. 11, 2008, Troopers Oliver Gorevski and Dave Feeney were working an Operation IMPACT detail in Rochester. The troopers stopped a vehicle for a seat belt violation and a broken tail light on Rocket Street. Upon stopping the car, the center, rear-seat passenger was seen moving around and reaching under the front seat, while two other rear seat passengers attempted to exit the vehicle.

Troopers detained all five individuals and observed a gun sticking out from under the driver's seat. In addition to the loaded, .40 caliber semi-automatic handgun, troopers found jewelry in the car, along with hoods and masks. As a result of the traffic stop by Troopers Gorevski and Feeney, two of the vehicle's occupants were positively identified during a show up as the individuals who committed an armed robbery on 7th Street, minutes before the traffic stop. The jewelry in the car also was identified by the victims of the robbery. The two subjects were each charged with first-degree robbery, third-degree grand larceny, second-degree criminal possession of a weapon and third degree criminal possession of a weapon.

Troop F

On May 6, 2008 at approximately 10:25 p.m., the City of Newburgh Police Department contacted the Troop F Major Crimes Unit for assistance with a drive-by shooting that killed 15-year-old Jeffrey Zachary.

Zachary was standing in front of 27 Dubois Street in Newburgh with several of his friends when a car approached. Several shots rang out and Zachary was struck once in the back; he was pronounced dead at the scene. The City of Newburgh detectives joined with members of the Major Crimes Unit and the suspect vehicle was quickly identified, located unattended in a nearby apartment complex. A search of the surrounding area resulted in members of the Major Crimes Unit locating the .38 caliber handgun that was used to kill Zachary. The owner of the vehicle was interviewed and stated that 16-year-old Joshua Torres of Beacon, and 21-year-old Daniel Correa of Newburgh were in possession of the vehicle at the time of the homicide. Following an all-night surveillance detail, Torres and Correa were located and brought to the City of Newburgh Police station where they were each interviewed by teams of City of Newburgh detectives and State Police investigators. Both Torres and Correa subsequently provided statements admitting to their involvement in the murder of Zachary, including their respective roles as driver and rear seat shooter. The defendants also stated that Zachary was not the intended target of the shooting, but was simply standing in front of the target's residence when the drive-by occurred. Both

defendants were remanded to the Orange County Jail, with Correa's bail set at \$1 million cash and Torres' set at \$500,000.

Troop G

On Dec. 17, 2008, Trooper Jeremy Shultis was assigned to a blue/gray patrol with Schenectady Police Officer McCracken as part of the Operation IMPACT strategy in the city of Schenectady. At 6:05 p.m. they were dispatched to the Mr. Discount convenience store at 1054 Crane St., advised two males had just robbed the clerk at gunpoint, one with a pistol, the other with a shotgun, taking an unknown amount of currency and cigarettes. Trooper Shultis and Officer McCracken arrived in the area and obtained information that one of the suspects was on a rooftop nearby. State Police Aviation was called and had a helicopter searched the area, while another officer in the area advised that one suspect was running down Fourth Avenue. Trooper Shultis and Officer McCracken exited their patrol vehicle and began to search the area on foot, locating one of the suspects running down Cutler Street. They were able to apprehend him a short time later. The second suspect also was apprehended. The money and weapons were located and the men were arrested and charged with armed robbery.

Troop K

On June 26, 2008, an IMPACT Team, conducting blue/gray patrols in the City of Mt. Vernon, responded to a shots-fired call at the intersection of Union Street and 3rd Avenue. Witnesses stated that two men were engaged in an altercation when both men began to shoot at each other. Trooper David Turner and his Mount Vernon PD partner arrived on scene and observed one subject running from the area. The subject was detained and it was later determined that the subject was one of two participants in the altercation and had been shot once in the ankle. A total of nine casings from both a .22 caliber and 9mm handgun were located at the scene. The second subject fled on foot.

C-NET

One of the numerous operations conducted by the New York State Police C-NET (Community Narcotics Enforcement Team) Unit in 2008 was centered on the City of Newburgh drug trade. In late 2007 and early 2008, members of the C-NET Unit joined with the City of Newburgh Police Department and the Orange County District Attorney's Office to target drug sales in open-air drug markets within drug-free school zones⁵ through "Operation Protect Our Children". When this initiative came to a conclusion – with a high-profile arrests sweep involving the participation of all the Orange County IMPACT partners – the State Police and the Newburgh Police Department had successfully obtained 115 indictments for third-degree criminal sale of a controlled substance and third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance with intent to sell, both felonies. Police also charged six juveniles; obtained and executed 13 search warrants; recovered four firearms (two handguns, one rifle, and one shotgun); and identified 17 gang members and 13 parolees. The initiative was so successful and the evidence against the offenders was so strong that the

majority of those arrested pleaded guilty to felony charges and are currently serving prison sentences. This initiative was the second phase of the effort to address open-air drug dealing in the City of Newburgh and illustrates beautifully the partnership aspect of Operation IMPACT.

Violent Felony Warrant (VFW) Squad

The State Police’s Violent Warrant Felony Squad participated in numerous individual IMPACT operations throughout the state, assisting IMPACT jurisdictions with advance work-ups on all the active warrants to be addressed. During each operation, teams were formed from various agencies in that particular area and given their assignments. The length of operations varied from location: some lasted one to three days, others were week-long and two, in Troops and E, ran for once a week for about half the calendar year. The chart below details the arrest numbers, warrants closed and work-hours for each VFW squad for the calendar year 2008. It should be noted that the difference in arrests and warrants closed is due to the fact that some defendants may have had more than one active warrant for them, the warrant may have been vacated or the subject was deceased.

NYS DIVISION OF PROBATION AND CORRECTIONAL ALTERNATIVES

The New York State Division of Probation and Correctional Alternatives (DPCA) was an early supporter of Operation IMPACT and continues to be a primary partner in the IMPACT Initiative. DPCA has worked closely with Probation Departments in the 17 IMPACT counties, and has extended the lessons learned there to Probation Departments statewide.

Under direct guidance from DPCA, Probation Departments have developed probation field intelligence officers to maximize collaboration and data-sharing with other law enforcement agencies. In doing so, probation departments have worked closely with the New York/New Jersey High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTA) Regional Intelligence Center (RIC) and the New York State Intelligence Center (NYSIC), and participated in specific IMPACT strategies and operations with regard to cultivating and distributing intelligence.

The county summaries in Section II of this report describe the collaborative nature of IMPACT, and Probation departments are valuable partners in every one of the IMPACT jurisdictions. Probation departments provide valuable probationer information to law enforcement; conduct joint warrant and curfew enforcement initiatives, bar checks, and “ride-alongs” with police officers; identify offenders that have a high risk of reoffending; and more. DPCA, working in collaboration with DCJS and the New York State Office of Cyber Security and Critical Infrastructure Coordination, recently obtained training for IMPACT probation departments in the Critical Infrastructure Response Information System (CIRIS) Mapping. Probation field intelligence officers also have joined the staff at the state’s Crime Analysis Centers in Buffalo, Rochester and Syracuse.

DPCA encourages its departments in non-IMPACT jurisdictions to embrace these strategies as well to enhance public safety throughout the state. Additionally, DPCA has promoted several initiatives statewide that provide benefits to the IMPACT partnerships. These initiatives include the following:

- Correctional Offender Management Profiling for Alternative Sanctions (COMPAS) and Youth Assessment Screening Instrument (YASI)– COMPAS (for adults) and YASI (for juveniles) are risk/need assessment tools that assist probation departments in identifying probationers with the highest risk and need levels and assessing the “criminogenic needs” of probationers that must be addressed to prevent re-offending. All 58 probation departments utilize the state’s web-based COMPAS and 56 utilize YASI.
- DNA Collection - Probation departments are required by law to collect DNA samples on certain offenders. With the assistance of DCJS, DPCA tracks the percentage of required DNA collected by probation departments. Since the inception of DNA collection, probation departments have collected more than 82,000 samples of DNA from probationers in New York State and helped identify offenders responsible for 684 crimes, including 65 homicides.
- Probation Department Automation - DPCA is working with DCJS, county probation departments and state contract vendor AutoMon to automate probation departments. This automation will provide uniform data that can be utilized for crime analysis to support IMPACT strategies. Currently, 39 counties are either implementing or in production with the case management system, Caseload Explorer.
- Operation Return - DPCA has embarked on a cooperative initiative with the United States Marshal’s Service, DCJS, local probation departments and the NY/NJ HIDTA Center to apprehend Sex Offender Registry Act (SORA) Level 2 and 3 probation absconders. Operation Return provides a package of guidance, resources and funding to facilitate the location and arrest of SORA Level 2 and 3 probation absconders. Probation absconders from 11 IMPACT counties are included in this initiative.

DPCA has provided continued support to the IMPACT initiative through direction and guidance provided to county probation directors and through their participation and input at both agency Crime Trends Meetings⁶ and monthly IMPACT state partner meetings.

NYS DIVISION OF PAROLE

The New York State Division of Parole has been an important partner in the Operation IMPACT initiative since its inception. Parole officers have a wealth of information that is not readily available to law enforcement and their willingness to share that information with the IMPACT law enforcement agencies has been invaluable. IMPACT law enforcement agencies have partnered with parole officers to conduct operations in all 17 IMPACT primary jurisdictions and the operations have been extremely successful. The ability to partner with parole officers and tap into their information is a critical component to each of the IMPACT crime reduction strategies.

During 2008, Parole offices joined with law enforcement in the 17 IMPACT jurisdictions for ride alongs, home visits, curfew checks, bar checks and warrant sweeps. One excellent example of the benefit of Parole as an IMPACT partner is in Oneida County and Utica, the primary IMPACT jurisdiction. Each month, parole officers provide the Utica Police Department with an up-to-date list of the people who are currently under parole supervision living in Utica. In return, the Utica Police Department provides parole with a list each month of all of the parolees living within the city that have had any kind of police contact during that month. This sharing of information has allowed law enforcement to closely monitor the parolee population, and as a result, parolee arrests in Utica increased in 2008 by 5.4 percent overall.

NYS OFFICE FOR THE PREVENTION OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

In 2008, the New York State Office for the Prevention of Domestic Violence (OPDV) took an active role in IMPACT. As part of the IMPACT V Request for Applications, applicants were asked to conduct a thorough analysis of their aggravated assaults to determine what percentage were domestic violence-related. If they found that a significant percentage were domestic in nature, or found other statistical proof that the incidence of domestic violence within their jurisdiction was high, they were encouraged to include a domestic violence component to their strategy.

Almost half of the IMPACT applications were submitted with some focus on domestic violence. The DV strategy components included:

Executive staff members from State Partner agencies attend these meetings in order to determine if there are additional resources that can be made available to the jurisdiction that will further assist them in their crime reduction efforts.

- Creating a committee to determine more precisely the parameters of domestic violence within a jurisdiction.
- Reviewing existing programs to identify one appropriate for the specific jurisdictional challenge.
- Hiring an intake specialist (housed within the police department) to work with victims and refer them to services soon after police contact; and
- Developing a database to capture information from Domestic Incident Reports filed within the county so that all police agencies in that county would have access to that information, improving their interdepartmental collaboration and strengthening their primary physical aggressor analysis.

OPDV staff members also worked with IMPACT jurisdictions that included a domestic violence component in their overall crime reduction strategy. OPDV and DCJS staff met several times to identify these applicants and discuss the strategies. The goal of OPDV, in working with these IMPACT sites, is to determine the unique needs of each site based on the problem and solutions as defined in the proposals, and work closely with the jurisdictions to assist them in meeting their goals.

In 2008, the DCJS IMPACT Unit staff worked closely with OPDV staff to arrange introductory meetings in the jurisdictions that included a DV component to their strategy. The purpose of these initial meetings was to introduce the IMPACT participants to the OPDV staff and the agency's mission and to foster a collaborative relationship that would allow OPDV to provide expertise regarding promising practices for policing domestic violence.

Through the meetings, OPDV staff learned what each jurisdiction planned to do with regard to domestic violence, and identified gaps that OPDV could fill. OPDV employs criminal justice professionals with an expertise in the fields of policing and probation, and these staff members were assigned to this initiative to work closely with the sites and determine areas where they might provide training and technical assistance. OPDV is now working directly with three IMPACT jurisdictions on this initiative – Albany, Westchester, and Rensselaer - with additional jurisdictions being added in 2009 to expand the effort.

NYS LIQUOR AUTHORITY

The New York State Liquor Authority (SLA) continues to provide beneficial services to the IMPACT strategies. Although the resources of the SLA are limited, the agency staff continues to assist when they can by assigning investigators to partner with IMPACT jurisdiction police officers to violate, and in some cases close down, problem bars and clubs. SLA focuses their efforts on the problematic establishments that have been shown through crime analysis to contribute to the overall crime problem within the IMPACT jurisdictions.

In a particularly impressive operation in Spring Valley, the SLA was instrumental in closing down eight bars and clubs in the village; these establishments that had been shown through crime mapping to be either directly or indirectly to blame for a disproportionate amount of violent crime within their radius. The majority of those establishments have remained closed throughout all of 2008 because of the strict tactics used by the SLA. They

recognized the contribution that these establishments were making to the criminal activity in the village and wanted to ensure that the steps that they took would be long-lasting.

The State Liquor Authority is consistently represented at each of the monthly Crime Trends Meetings and the agency remains available to assist jurisdictions when needed.

SECTION IV

IMPACT Overview

Operation IMPACT in New York State

The goal of Operation IMPACT is to reduce crime, particularly violent and firearm-related crime, in the 17 counties in New York State that account for almost 80% of total crime outside of New York City. This program provides funding, resources, and technical assistance, and fosters enhanced partnerships among participating agencies. Successful crime reduction strategies incorporate timely, accurate crime reporting; crime analysis; intelligence development and sharing; rapid deployment of personnel; formulation and evaluation of strategic operations; and community efforts.

The police jurisdiction which reports the highest volume of violent crime within the county is designated as the primary IMPACT site. The county District Attorney and Chief of Police in the primary jurisdiction lead the IMPACT partnership and coordinate the IMPACT strategy. During 2008, 84 local agencies received Operation IMPACT funding.

In 2008, Operation IMPACT was supported by \$16.6 million in funding. Grants were awarded on a competitive basis and required all participating jurisdictions to focus on reducing violent crime. Jurisdictions were also required to enhance their crime analysis capability, further develop their use of criminal intelligence, and include an enforcement, prosecution and community component.



- Report all recovered crime guns to the State Police and ATF, and process all crime guns at the local forensic laboratory

Timely, accurate crime data are essential for criminal justice decision-making. All primary IMPACT sites are required to submit a monthly summary of reported crime to DCJS within 30 days of the end of the reporting month. These data are summarized and returned to all IMPACT partners and show the most recent levels of reported crime for murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and violent crime involving a firearm. Up-to-date crime information is also posted on eJusticeNY to inform law enforcement agencies of recent trends in their county and region.

Expanding Information Sharing and Intelligence


Information shared among law enforcement helps to solve and prevent crime. IMPACT agencies are contractually required to use several critical statewide information-sharing systems, including the two described below.

SAFETNet

When two agencies unknowingly investigate the same individual, officers can be put in harm's way, especially if the investigation results in one police agency executing a search warrant at a location that has undercover detectives present from another agency. The Safe Automated Fast Event Tracking Network (SAFETNet) is the State's secure deconfliction system that maintains information on targets and locations currently under investigation. Police agencies which register targets immediately learn if the target is the subject of another investigation, promoting interagency coordination and ensuring officer safety.

✓ The number of investigative targets entered into SAFETNet by the 17 primary IMPACT jurisdictions decreased during 2008. A total of 9,291 targets were submitted as compared to 9,483 during 2007, a decrease of -2%.

Operation IMPACT in New York State

Crime Gun Activity

Operation IMPACT contracts require participating agencies to share information about firearms. When law enforcement agencies outside of New York City recover a firearm which was used in a crime or suspected to have been used in a crime, the agency sends a detailed message about the crime gun to the New York State Criminal Gun Clearinghouse. This message is sent through the New York State Police Information Network (NYSPIN) and is called a GGUN transaction. The Clearinghouse, which is part of the New York State Police, transmits this information to the Federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) for analysis and investigation. New York City provides crime gun information directly to ATF.

Law enforcement agencies are also required to transmit an electronic record through NYSPIN for all guns that are reported as lost or stolen. The Criminal Gun Clearinghouse compares the stolen/lost gun records to the Crime Gun records and generates a hit notice for all matches. These hits provide valuable investigative leads on both the initial theft of the gun and any subsequent crimes committed with the gun.

In addition, IMPACT jurisdictions are required to submit crime guns and any ballistic evidence found, such as bullets or shell casings, to their local forensics laboratory for analysis. Subsequent to lab testing, forensic information from the gun and any ballistic evidence is then entered into shared forensic databases where forensic information can link recovered firearms to ballistic profiles from other crime scenes.

This multi-faceted approach to processing and sharing information from firearms helps law enforcement to solve crimes and investigate gun activity.
