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## **Opening Remarks**

The 238<sup>th</sup> session of the NYS Municipal Police Training Council (MPTC) commenced at 10:00 a.m. with Chairman Ronald Spike leading those in attendance in the Pledge of Allegiance. Chairman Spike asked for a moment of silence to recognize and honor those who have lost their lives while serving in public safety.

## **ACTION/APPROVAL ITEMS**

### **#1 – Adoption of Agenda and Approval of 237<sup>th</sup> Meeting Minutes**

There was a **motion made by Chief Parisi to adopt the 237<sup>th</sup> MPTC Meeting Agenda, which was seconded by Commissioner McBride**; the motion was unanimously approved.

### **#2 – Basic Course for Police Officers- Part 7-M Human Trafficking**

Supervisor, Public Safety Programs, Joshua Vinehout of the Office of Public Safety presented an overview of updates to Part 7-M, Human Trafficking, of the Basic Course for Police Officers (BCPO). The curriculum has been amended to include the Human Trafficking Awareness curriculum that was disseminated to social services agencies in May 2017. Content specific to law enforcement was also added. This content includes penal law amendments and challenges to interviewing human trafficking victims. The Office of Children and Family Services and the Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance served as subject matter experts in reviewing the curriculum.

**Motion:** Approve Part 7-M Human Trafficking as the minimum standard of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers.

**Chief Zack** made a motion to approve updates as submitted and was seconded by **Commissioner McBride**. The motion was passed by a unanimous vote.

### **#3 – Identification Procedures: Photo Arrays and Line-Ups Protocol and Training**

Executive Deputy Commissioner Michael Green of the Division of Criminal Justice Services informed the Council of amendments made to the Criminal Procedure Law involving Identification procedures, effective July 1, 2017. Amendments allow for photo array identification procedures to be admissible in prosecutorial cases at trial. DCJS, collaborating with the Council, will be responsible for updating training information as appropriate to reflect these amendments.

Michael Puckett of the Office of Public Safety provided an overview of the changes made to the Identification Procedures Model Policy to reflect the new legislation. Changes were minor, and included addressing the definitions of “blind” and “blinded” to be consistent with the legislation; clarification and strengthening of “blinded” procedures; addressing confidence statements; recording procedures endorsed with witness consent; and updating forms to reflect protocol changes. Upon further discussion, the Council decided to amend Section C6 of the model policy, addressing confidence statements. The Council added the pre-emptive statement, “This question is not intended to suggest how certain or uncertain you might be about an identification”, to the section, before the witness is asked to state their confidence in their identification.

**Motion 1:** Adopt the new Identification Procedures: Photo Arrays and Line-Ups Protocol to replace the current MPTC Identification Procedures Model Policy, with modifications to Section 3-C, which addresses the use of confidence statements.

**Chairman Spike** made a motion to approve, and was seconded by **Sheriff O'Flynn**. The motion was passed by unanimous vote.

**Motion 2:** Disseminate in collaboration with DCJS Identification Procedures: Photo Arrays and Line-Ups Protocol in accordance with Executive Law 840 (4).

**Chairman Spike** made a motion to approve, and was seconded by **Commissioner McBride**. The motion was passed by unanimous vote.

**Motion 3:** Adopt the identification procedures protocol training program for all current and new police officers in accordance with Executive Law 840 (4).

**Chairman Spike** made a motion to approve, and was seconded by Chief Parisi. The motion was passed by unanimous vote.

### **INFORMATIONAL / UPDATE ITEMS**

#### **#1 – Recording of Custodial Interrogation Legislation**

DCJS Executive Deputy Commissioner Michael Green informed the Committee of a change in legislation requiring the recording of custodial interrogations for certain types of crimes that carry extended sentences. Interrogations will be recorded start to finish, if the person being questioned is considered a suspect. The Council will oversee the development of best practice recommendations to ensure the facets of this legislation are being upheld. Best practice considerations include types of equipment needed, and agency resources. The legislation will be passed in April, 2018.

#### **#2 – Latent Print Levels I, II, and III Training**

DCJS Executive Deputy Commissioner Michael Green updated the Council on changes being implemented to the Latent Print Levels I, II and III training curricula. DCJS is currently working with lab directors across New York State to review the proposed training curriculum. The Council will work to modernize and update the curriculum to better reflect a forensic science focus for the training. Another goal is to issue certificates of completion for two separate trainings, one training on lifting and preserving prints, the other on the comparison of prints. Emphasis will be on testing proficiency of these skills, rather than certifying persons who complete the training. A third goal of the program is to identify a uniform set of standards to be applied to the 19 existing SABIS sites, which are utilized by non-DCJS employees to process fingerprints.

#### **#3 – Regulation Amendment Updates**

Associate Attorney Natasha Harvin of the DCJS Office of Legal Services (OLS) updated the Council on the status of the regulatory amendments to Title 9 of the Compilation of Codes, Rules, and Regulations of the State of New York (9 NYCRR). 9 NYCRR Part 6024, which will allow federal law enforcement officers to conduct firearms training, is still at the Governor's

office awaiting approval. The amendments to 9 NYCRR Parts 6020 and 6025 pertaining to equivalency certificates for any officer who has been removed for cause, are also still in the Governor's office awaiting approval.

#### **#4 – Basic Course for Police Officers – Part 6-B Counter Terrorism**

Associate Training Technician Scott Neff of the Office of Public Safety informed the Council of proposed updates to Part 6-B, Counterterrorism, of the Basic Course for Police Officers. The current curriculum, written shortly after the September 11 terrorist attacks, has a strong focus on terrorism. The new curriculum will focus more on mass casualty and active shooter events, teaching local law enforcement how to respond. Online training options are currently being explored, in replacement of the existing 8-hour classroom session. Online training platforms being reviewed include: SLATT (State and Local Anti-Terrorism Training Group); the Center for Homeland Security and Defense; the National Consortium for the Study of Terrorism and Response to Terrorism; and POPS (Center for Problem Oriented Policing). An online curriculum would eliminate the need for instructors, and would allow for additional classroom time, as an online course could be completed outside of the classroom.

#### **#5 – Basic Course for Police Officers – Implementation of Use of Force and Defensive Tactics Curriculum Updates**

Senior Training Technician Michael Puckett of the Office of Public Safety provided the Council with updates on the Use of Force curriculum of the Basic Course for Police Officers. The course is currently 7-hours. The updated curriculum will be outlined in a lesson plan format for more standardized delivery, with an emphasis on the reasonableness standard of force, rather than an emphasis on Article 35. A course pilot is planned for August 2017, and will be presented to the Ulster County Law Enforcement Training group. The pilot will determine the number of hours of the updated curriculum. Mr. Puckett does not envision the course hours being much higher than the current 7. The final section of the curriculum will be presented at the Council meeting on September 6<sup>th</sup>, at which point the Office of Public Safety will request that the Council endorse an instructor requirement for the course.

Next, Senior Training Technician Daniel Nedwell of the Office of Public Safety provided the Council with updates on the Defensive Tactics curriculum of the Basic Course for Police Officers. The updated curriculum will be principle-based, utilizing the principles of mobility; disengage/engage; transition; and angles. These principles will be emphasized throughout this section, so that recruits can utilize them once they are on the job. In addition, the tactics being taught will be simplified and reduced in number. This section, like Use of Force, will also be presented to the Council for approval at the September 6 meeting. At that time, a Defensive Tactics Refresher Course will also be presented for approval. It will be a one or two-day course to be delivered statewide, and will operate in a train-the-trainer format.

**New Business**

There being no further business, the 238<sup>th</sup> session of the Municipal Police Training Council came to a close at 12:00 pm, **with a motion to adjourn by Deputy Commissioner Wood and a second by Commissioner McBride.** The motion was unanimously approved.

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**Action Item #3**

**Basic Criminal Investigations Course**

The Office of Public Safety will present an update to a learning objective of the Basic Criminal Investigations Course- Identification Procedures Section 6.1 for the Council's review and approval.

**Training Objective:**

Explain the process of conducting a "double blind" photo array.

**Motion:** Approve Section 6.1 with the new learning objective as the minimum standard of instruction in the Basic Criminal Investigations Course - Identification Procedures.



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**Action Item #4**

**Defensive Tactics and Principles of Control**

The Office of Public Safety will present to the Council revisions made to the Interpersonal Skills and Arrest Techniques - Part 4, Section J of the Basic Course for Police Officers. This 40-hour section has been revised to focus solely on defensive tactics and has been renamed Defensive Tactics and Principles of Control. Previous content in addition to defensive tactics, which includes interpersonal skills, aerosol subject restraint, active shooter, and crowd and riot control formations, have been removed and are now either stand-alone sections or have been incorporated into an existing section of the Basic Course for Police Officers. For this agenda item, Office of Public Safety Staff will provide an overview and implementation plan for the Council's review and approval of the new 40-hour Defensive tactics and Principles of Control curriculum. The sections removed will be covered in subsequent agenda items.

**Training Objectives:**

1. Explain the limits that the U.S. Constitution, New York State Laws and agency policies place on use of force and how it relates to defensive tactics.
2. Explain the importance of utilizing proper approach techniques.
3. Explain and demonstrate the importance of having situational awareness, self-control and balance.
4. Identify the difference in compliant, passive resistance, active resistance, aggressive resistance and aggravated aggressive resistance subjects.
5. Identify the circumstances under which "presence" is an appropriate response alternative.
6. Identify the circumstances under which "dialogue" is an appropriate response alternative.
7. Identify the circumstances under which "compliance techniques" is an appropriate response alternative.
8. Identify the circumstances under which "defensive alternatives" is an appropriate response alternative.
9. Identify the circumstances under which "deadly force" is an appropriate response alternative.
10. Effectively demonstrate the proper technique for grab control.

11. Effectively demonstrate proper takedown defense techniques.
12. Effectively demonstrate proper striking techniques
13. Effectively demonstrate proper punch defense by performing the shelling technique.
14. Effectively demonstrate proper takedown techniques
15. Effectively demonstrate impact weapon tactics techniques
16. Effectively demonstrate how to control a subject taken to the ground
17. Effectively demonstrate how to place barriers and escape a subject on the ground
18. Effectively demonstrate techniques for maintaining control of a handgun utilizing the C.U.T. method
19. Effectively demonstrate techniques for maintaining control of a long gun utilizing the C.O.R.E. method
20. Effectively demonstrate techniques for defending against a weapon (gun, knife etc. etc.) utilizing the acronym I.C.A.T.
21. Effectively demonstrate the mechanics of a shoulder pin restraint.  
**(Optional)**
22. Explain potentially lethal target areas of the human body.
23. Effectively demonstrate application and use of handcuffs
24. Explain the various types of person searches and comprehend the methods used.
25. Effectively demonstrate proper techniques in conducting a person search
26. List common mistakes which are made when transporting prisoners and identify the elements of safe transports and effectively demonstrate practical application.

**Motion 1:** Approve Defensive Tactics and Principles of Control - Part 4, Section J as the minimum standard of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers or equivalent, Specialized Investigator Police Training Course, Basic Course for Peace Officers, and Campus Public Safety Officers Course.

**Motion 2:** All employers and academies conducting a Basic Course for Police Officers or equivalent and the Specialized Investigator Police Training Course beginning on or after January 1, 2018 must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

**Motion 3:** All employers and academies conducting the Basic Course for Peace Officers and Campus Public Safety Officers Course beginning on or after September 1, 2018 must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

**Motion 4:** All defensive tactics instructors must complete the DCJS two-day Defensive Tactics Refresher Course to receive DCJS curriculum approval after the implementation date requirement. This applies to all courses that utilize the Defensive Tactics and Principles of Control curriculum, as well as, approval to conduct annual in-service other weapon baton training.

**Motion 5:** Increase the maximum number of hours per day to practice defensive tactics skills from 3 to 4 hours (not to exceed 20 hours in a one week period) for all employers and academies utilizing the new Defensive Tactics and Principles of Control curriculum where required for basic police, specialized investigator, and peace officer training courses.

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**Action Item #5**

**Aerosol Subject Restraint**

The Office of Public Safety will present to the Council for their review and approval a new six-hour block of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers titled Aerosol Subject Restraint - Part 4, Section U. This new section was formerly included in Part 4, Section J and is now a stand-alone section.

**Training Objectives:**

1. Identify techniques associated with the proper use of OC spray, including specific areas on a person and effectively demonstrate practical application.
2. List the various types of OC delivery systems.
3. Explain factors to consider that would warrant the use of OC Spray.
4. Explain the decontamination procedures for people and areas.
5. Identify the actions to be taken by an officer if sprayed with OC.

**Motion 1:** Approve Aerosol Subject Restraint - Part 4, Section U as the minimum standard of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers or equivalent, Specialized Investigator Police Training Course, Basic Course for Peace Officers, Campus Public Safety Officers Course and Initial Other Weapons Course – Aerosol Subject Restraint

**Motion 2:** All employers and academies conducting a Basic Course for Police Officers and the Specialized Investigator Police Training Course beginning on or after January 1, 2018 must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

**Motion 3:** All employers and academies conducting Basic Course for Peace Officers, Campus Public Safety Officers Course and Initial Other Weapons Course – Aerosol Subject Restraint beginning on or after September 1, 2018 must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

**Motion 4:** Any aerosol subject restraint instructor must complete the Aerosol Subject Restraint Instructor Course to receive DCJS curriculum approval after the implementation date requirement. This applies to all courses that utilize the Aerosol Subject Restraint recruit curriculum, as well as, approval to conduct annual in-service other weapon aerosol subject restraint training.

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**Action Item #6**

**Aerosol Subject Restraint Instructor Course**

Although there are no changes to the hours, topics, and learning objectives of the Municipal Police Training Council Aerosol Subject Restraint Instructor Course, the Office of Public Safety will present to the Council for their review and approval changes made to the curriculum that support the current learning objectives of the instructor course. These changes reflect revisions that were made to the Basic Course for Police Officers Aerosol Subject Restraint - Section 4, Part U.

**Training Objectives:**

1. No changes to learning objectives

**Motion 1:** Approve the updated Municipal Police Training Council Aerosol Subject Restraint Instructor course.

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**Action Item #7**

**Active Shooter Curriculum**

The Office of Public Safety will present to the Council for their review and approval a new 16-hour block of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers titled Active Shooter - Section 4, Part T. This new section was formerly included in Section 4, Part J and is now a stand-alone section.

**Training Objectives:**

1. Demonstrate an understanding of the course objectives as set forth in one of the following approved curriculum: IRAS (Initial Response to Active Shooters), ALERRT Level 1 (Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training), LASER (Law Enforcement Active Shooter Emergency Response), ASTTP (Active Shooter Threat Training Program), or NTOA (National Tactical Officers Association Police Response to Active Shooter).

**Motion 1:** Approve Active Shooter - Section 4, Part T as the minimum standard of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers or equivalent and Specialized Investigator Police Training Course and require all instructors teaching this section to be at minimum a Defensive Tactics, Firearms, Reality Based, or Approved Special Topics Instructor.

**Motion 2:** All employers and academies conducting a Basic Course for Police Officers or equivalent and the Specialized Investigator Police Training Course beginning after January 1, 2018 must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

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**Action Item #8**

**Active Shooter Unarmed Peace Officer Curriculum**

The Office of Public Safety will present to the Council for their review and approval a new two-hour block of instruction titled Active Shooter Event Response to be utilized in the Basic Course for Peace Officers for training unarmed peace officers

**Training Objectives:**

1. Define an active threat.
2. Define active shooter.
3. Explain the difference between a lockout and lockdown.
4. Identify and list the effective civilian responses to active shooter events.
5. Define the Avoid, Deny, and Defend concepts.

**Motion 1:** Approve the two-hour Active Shooter Event Response training for inclusion in the Basic Course for Peace Officers and Campus Public Safety Officers Course and require all instructors teaching this section to be at minimum a General Topics Instructor or Approved Special Topics Instructor.

**Motion 2:** All employers and academies conducting the Basic Course for Peace Officers and Campus Public Safety Officers Course beginning on or after September 1, 2018 must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

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**Action Item #9**

**Nature and Control of Civil Disorder Curriculum**

The Office of Public Safety will present to the Council for their review and approval an update to Nature and Control of Civil Disorder - Part 6, Section C. The update includes two new learning objectives that cover crowd and riot control formations which were previously included in Part 4, Section J. The addition of the learning objectives will increase the hours of the section from two to three hours.

**Training Objectives:**

1. Identify commonly used formations used in crowd and riot control formations.
2. Demonstrate the proper procedure and technique of basic crowd and riot control formations.

**Motion 1:** Approve revisions to Nature and Control of Civil Disorder - Part 6, Section C as the minimum standard of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers and Campus Public Safety Officer Course and require all instructors teaching this section to be at minimum a General Topics Instructor.

**Motion 2:** All employers and training academies conducting a Basic Course for Police Officers beginning on or after January 1, 2018 must utilize this approved curriculum.

**Motion 3:** All employers and training academies conducting a Campus Public Safety Officer Course beginning on or after September 1, 2018 must utilize the approved curriculum.



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**Action Item #10**

**Professional Communications Curriculum**

The Office of Public Safety will present to the Council for their review and approval a new eight-hour block of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers titled Professional Communications - Part 4, Section V. This new section was formerly included in Part 4, Section J and has been revised now functioning as a stand-alone section.

**Training Objectives:**

1. Define situational awareness as described in this text.
2. List the five maxims of communication.
3. Identify the elements of professional communication skills
4. Explain how the concept of “contact and cover” relates directly to officer safety and communication.
5. List officer generated barriers to communication.
6. List the three stages of conflict.
7. List the suggested “do’s and don’ts” regarding de-escalation.
8. List the signals of submission.
9. Demonstrate professional communication skills.

**Motion #1:** Approve Professional Communications - Part 4, Section V as the minimum standard of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers or equivalent, Specialized Investigator Police Training Course, Basic Course for Peace Officers, and Campus Public Safety Officers Course and require all instructors teaching this section to be at minimum a General Topics Instructor.

**Motion #2:** All employers and academies conducting a Basic Course for Police Officers or equivalent and the Specialized Investigator Police Training Course beginning on or after January 1, 2018 must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

**Motion #3:** All employers and academies conducting the Basic Course for Peace Officers and Campus Public Safety Officers Course beginning on or after September 1, 2018 must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

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**Action Item #11**

**Procedural Justice Curriculum**

The Office of Public Safety will present to the Council for their review and approval a new two-hour block of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers titled Procedural Justice - Part 2, Section E.

**Training Objectives:**

1. Define Police Legitimacy
2. Define Procedural Justice
3. Explain 5 out of the 9 benefits of Procedural Justice
4. Name two primary foundations for Procedural Justice
5. Identify and explain the four pillars of Procedural Justice

**Motion#1:** Approve Procedural Justice - Part 2, Section E as the minimum standard of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers or equivalent, Specialized Investigator Police Training Course, Basic Course for Peace Officers, and Campus Public Safety Officers Course and require all instructors teaching this section to be at minimum a General Topics Instructor.

**Motion#2:** All employers and academies conducting the Basic Course for Police Officers or equivalent, Specialized Investigator Police Training Course, Basic Course for Peace Officers, and Campus Public Safety Officers Course beginning on or after September 6, 2017 must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

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**Action Item #12**

**Basic Course for Police Officers - Use of Physical Force and Deadly Physical Force**

The Office of Public Safety will present to the Council for their review and approval an update to Justification – Use of Physical Force and Deadly Physical Force - Part 3, Section B of the Basic Course for Police Officers. The revised section has been renamed to Use of Physical Force and Deadly Physical Force and provides recruits with the understanding on the limitations of the use of force in accomplishing lawful objectives. The revision of the current learning objectives will increase the hours of the section from seven to eleven hours.

**Training Objectives:**

1. Describe the balance between police authority and responsibility pertaining to the use of force.
2. Define “physical force,” “deadly physical force,” “physical injury” and “serious physical injury.
3. Recognize circumstances that justify the use of physical force and the use of deadly physical force by police.
4. Recognize the considerations and consequences associated with use of physical force and deadly physical force.
5. Describe the relationship and differences between federal law, state law, and agency policy regarding police use of force.
6. Identify and apply relevant case law to developing police use of force policies and procedure in NYS and nationwide.
7. Describe the application of current case law that must be considered when judging the reasonableness of force.
8. Verbally articulate police use of force actions while utilizing in class scenarios and identify documentation requirements necessary to accurately record use of force situations.

**Motion 1:** Approve Use of Physical Force and Deadly Physical Force - Part 3, Section B as the minimum standard of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers, Specialized Investigator Police Training Course, Basic Course for Peace Officers, Campus Public Safety Officers Course, Initial Course in Firearms, and any initial other weapon(s) course.

**Motion 2:** All employers and academies conducting a Basic Course for Police Officers and the Specialized Investigator Police Training Course beginning on or after January 1, 2018 must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

**Motion 3:** All employers and academies conducting Basic Course for Peace Officers, Campus Public Safety Officers Course, Initial Course in Firearms and any initial other weapon(s) course beginning on or after September 1, 2018 must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

**Motion 4:** All instructors must complete the DCJS two-day Use of Force Curriculum Overview training to receive DCJS course approval after the implementation date requirement. This applies to all courses that utilize the Use of Physical Force and Deadly Physical Force curriculum, as well as, approval to instruct annual in-service use of force training.
