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Domestic Homicide in New York State 2018

This report presents a statistical account of domestic homicides reported by police departments and sheriffs' offices in 2018 to the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS).

Definitions: Domestic homicide is defined as a murder or non-negligent manslaughter in which the victim was known to have a domestic relationship with the offender, such as an intimate partner or another family member.¹

An "intimate partner" relationship includes spouse, ex-spouse, heterosexual or same-sex partner or ex-partner, whether or not the victim and offender lived together at the time of the incident or previously.² "Other family" member includes child under 18,³ parent, sibling or other family relationship.

Data: The data analyzed for this report are taken from the Supplementary Homicide Report (SHR) submitted by police agencies to DCJS as of August 13, 2019.

Submitted as part of New York State's Uniform Crime Reporting program, the SHR details case-level information on all criminal homicides reported to police, and includes the following information:

victim-offender relationship; demographics of victim and offender, such as gender, race/ethnicity and age; and the type of weapon used in the crime.⁴

Overview: Domestic homicides are compared in this report to the total number of homicides statewide and in the state's two regions: the five counties (also known as boroughs) of New York City and the Rest of the State, defined as the 57 counties outside of the five boroughs.

This report also details the demographic characteristics of all homicide and domestic homicide victims and the types of weapons used. Specific details also are included about:

- Intimate partner homicide, which is the most frequent type of domestic homicide;
- Homicides involving minor child victims; and
- Those involving other family member victims.

Statistics for the 10-year period from 2009 to 2018 and county-specific data also are included.

Major Findings

- Domestic homicides accounted for 19.5 percent of all homicides reported in the state (111 of 569).
- Domestic and non-domestic homicides both increased slightly from 2017 (3% and 4%, respectively).
- There were 59 intimate partner homicides reported in 2018. This total is the same as reported in 2017 and the lowest since 2007, the first year in which DCJS began tracking this data.
- Statewide, 45.3 percent of female homicide victims who were 16 or older were killed by their intimate partners as compared to 2.4 percent of all male homicide victims of the same age.
- Statewide, a firearm was the most common weapon used in intimate partner homicides (25 of 59 or 42.4%).
- In New York City, a knife, cutting instrument or blunt object was the most common weapon used in intimate partner homicides, while a firearm was most commonly used in the Rest of the State.

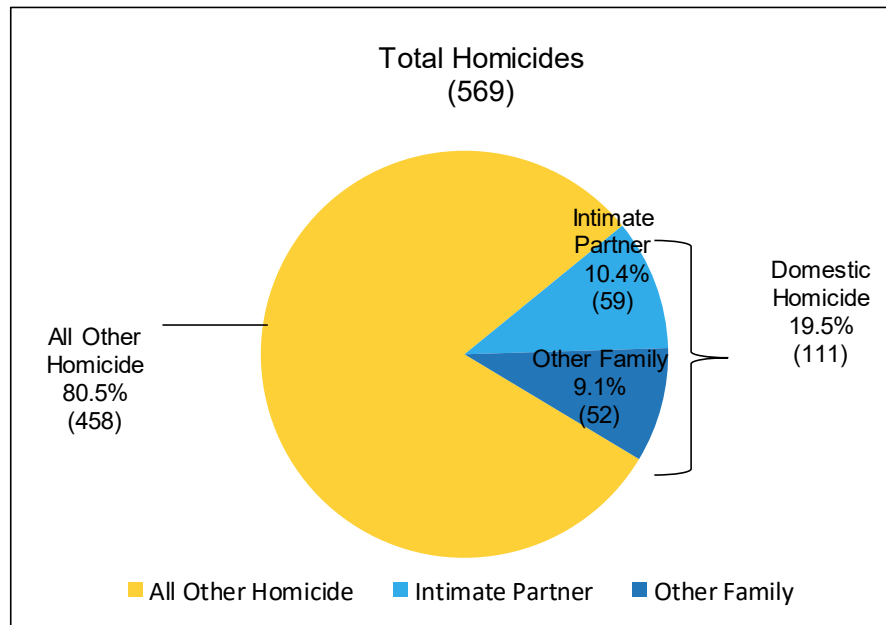
¹ Homicide is defined as "the willful killing of one human being by another." *Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook*. Murder and non-negligent manslaughter refer to crimes in New York State Penal Laws Section 125.15 through Section 125.27 and include: murder in the first and second degree, aggravated murder, aggravated manslaughter in the first and second degree, and manslaughter in the first and second degree.

² New York Criminal Procedure Law section 530.11(1)(a-e).

³ "Child" is defined as an individual who is under 18 years old and is a biological or adopted child.

⁴ New York City homicide data are extracted from the New York City Police Department Shootings and Homicides database, which differs from the SHR but not in ways that substantially affect this analysis.

Chart 1. Total Homicides and Domestic Homicides by Type of Relationship in New York State



There were 569 homicide victims reported in 2018 and of those, 111 (19.5%) involved a domestic relationship.

The victim and offender were intimate partners in 59 of 111 domestic homicides. Intimate partner victims represented 53.1 percent of domestic homicide victims and 10.4 percent of all homicide victims.

The remaining 52 domestic homicide victims were killed by “other family” members. Those victims were most commonly the child, parent or sibling of the offender.

Nine domestic homicides reported in 2018 involved multiple victims. The perpetrator was an adult male in eight of the nine incidents:

- A male offender killed his ex-girlfriend and her 29-year-old daughter.
- A male offender killed his wife and 12-year-old daughter, then committed suicide.
- A male offender killed his ex-girlfriend and her new boyfriend, then committed suicide.
- A male offender killed his girlfriend and her 14-month old son.
- A male offender killed his ex-girlfriend and her 45-year old male friend.
- A male offender killed his ex-girlfriend, their 6-year old son, and his 37-year old wife, then committed suicide.
- A female offender killed her ex-husband and his wife.
- A male offender killed his 1-year-old daughter, his 16-year-old half-brother and his 57-year-old stepfather.
- A male offender killed his 45-year-old mother, his 18-year-old sister, 16-year-old brother and 1-year-old nephew.

Table 1 compares domestic and other homicides in New York City and the Rest of the State in 2018. Of the 569 homicides reported statewide, 295 (51.8%) occurred in New York City and 274 (48.2%) occurred in the Rest of the State. Appendix A details county and regional statistics.

- There were more homicide victims in New York City than in the Rest of the State, but domestic homicides were more common outside of the five boroughs: 21.9 percent (60) of all reported homicide victims were killed in domestic incidents in the Rest of State, compared to 17.3 percent (51) in New York City.

Table 2 compares the gender of homicide victims 16 and older statewide and by region. The vast majority (525 of 569 or 92.3%) of victims were 16 or older.

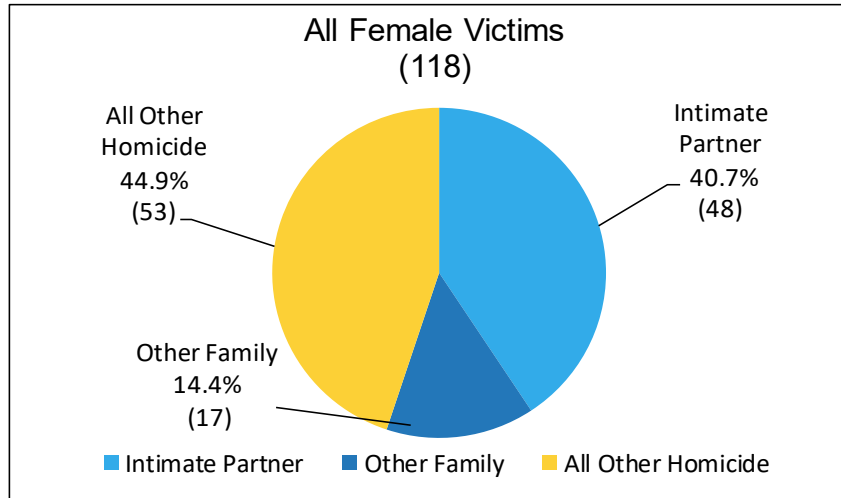
- Statewide, there were 106 female homicide victims who were 16 or older, with 45.3 percent killed by their intimate partner.
- In New York City, 45.8 percent of victims were killed by an intimate partner as compared to 44.8 percent in the Rest of the State.

⁵ For this report, intimate partners include spouse, ex-spouse, heterosexual partner or ex-partner, and same-sex partner or ex-partner, whether or not the victim and offender were living together at the time of the homicide or had previously lived together. NYPD homicide statistics include victims of domestic homicide incidents who are not intimate partners or members of the same family. These victims are excluded from this report.

Domestic Homicides vs. all Homicides by Victim Gender

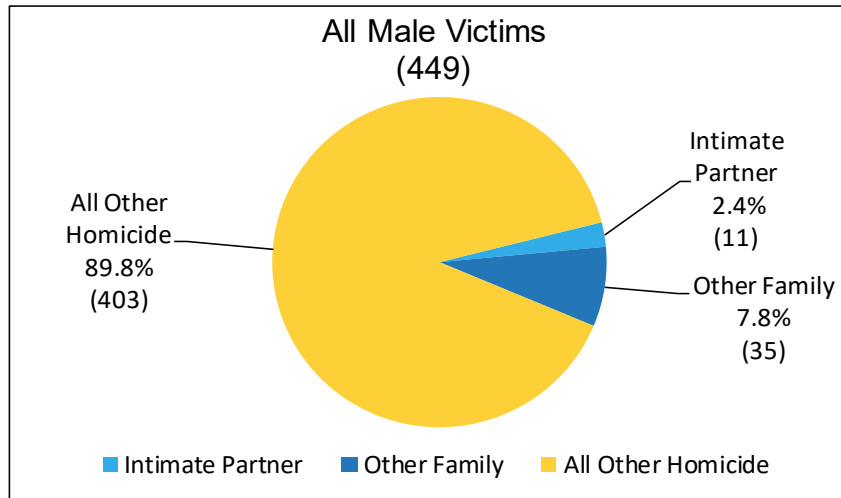
Charts 2 and 3 detail the number of female and male domestic homicide victims by type of relationship to the offender as compared to all homicide victims in the state.

Chart 2. Domestic Homicides and Other Homicides of All Female Victims by Type of Relationship in New York State



- Statewide, 55.1 percent of the 118 female homicide victims were killed in a domestic homicide, either by an intimate partner or other family member.
- Among the 53 females killed in a non-domestic homicide, 17 were killed by a friend, acquaintance, neighbor or someone otherwise known to the victim; three were killed by a stranger. The victim-offender relationship was listed as unknown or not reported for 33 female victims.

Chart 3. Domestic Homicides and Other Homicides of All Male Victims by Type of Relationship in New York State



- The vast majority of males were killed in a non-domestic incident: 403 (89.8%) of 449.
- In contrast to female homicide victims, only 11 (2.4%) of the 449 male homicide victims were killed by an intimate partner and 35 (7.8%) by another family member.
- Among the 403 males killed in a non-domestic homicide, 114 were killed by a friend, acquaintance, neighbor or someone otherwise known to the victim; 36 were killed by a stranger; and one was killed by an employer. The victim-offender relationship was listed as unknown or not reported for 252 male victims.

Demographics of Domestic Homicide Victims

Table 3 presents the gender and race/ethnicity of domestic and other homicide victims by region. A synopsis of these statistics follows on Page 6.

Gender

- Females were most frequently the victims of intimate partner homicides: 81.4 percent (48 of 59). Meanwhile, females were only 11.6 percent (53 of 458) of victims of all other homicides.
- Males were most often the victims in non-domestic homicides: 88 percent (403 of 458).

Race and Ethnicity

- More than three-quarters of all victims in non-domestic homicides — 79.7 percent — were either black or Hispanic (60.9% black and 18.8% Hispanic).
- In domestic homicides, 39.6 percent (44) of victims were white, 36 percent (40) were black and 19.8 percent (22) were Hispanic.
- New York City reported more black (27) and Hispanic victims (14) of domestic homicide than white victims (7).
- In the Rest of the State, whites (37) were most commonly the victims of domestic homicide. There were 13 black victims and eight Hispanic victims.
- Among the 59 intimate partner homicide victims statewide, 37.3 percent (22) were white: three in New York City (10%) and 19 (65.5%) in the Rest of the State.
- Blacks were victims in 18 intimate partner homicides statewide (30.5%): 13 in New York City (43.3%) and five (17.2%) in the Rest of the State.
- Hispanics were victims in 16 intimate partner homicides statewide (27.1%): 12 in New York City (40.0%) and four (13.8%) in the Rest of the State.

Table 4 presents domestic homicide victims by age group and type of relationship.

- There were more intimate partner victims younger than 30 (27.6%) in the Rest of the State, as compared to New York City (16.7%).
- In contrast, New York City had more intimate partner victims who were 30 through 49 (46.7%) when compared to the Rest of the State (31%).
- In New York City, 28.6 percent of other family victims were younger than 5 years old, as compared to 38.7 percent in the Rest of the State.

Child Victims of Domestic Homicide

Table 5 presents demographics of child victims of domestic homicide. Child victims are those younger than 18 who were killed by a parent, a parent's intimate partner or another family member.

- Statewide, there were 26 child victims of domestic homicide: nine in New York City and 17 in the Rest of the State.
- Of those 26 child victims, 18 (69.2%) were younger than 5 years old and of those, three were infants.
- A parent was the perpetrator in 17 child victim homicides; another family member, five; a sibling, three; and a step-parent, one.

Adult Family Member Victims of Domestic Homicide

- For purposes of this report, an adult is defined as 18 years old or older.
- Statewide, there were 26 adult victims of domestic homicide: nine parents; eight other family members; six siblings; one child; one in-law; and one step-parent (*data not shown in table*).

Weapons Used in Domestic Homicide

Table 6 details the type of weapon used in domestic homicides and the relationship of the victim to the offender. Weapon types include firearms; knives, cutting instruments or blunt objects; personal weapons (hands, feet and teeth); and miscellaneous weapons (motor vehicle, fire and poison).

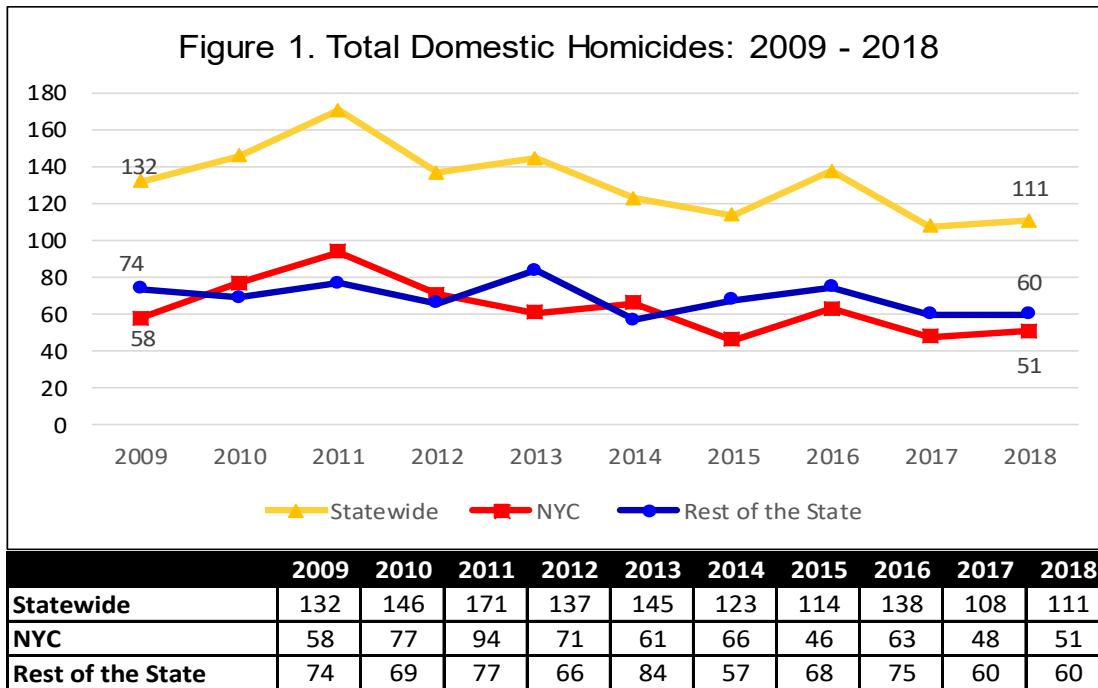

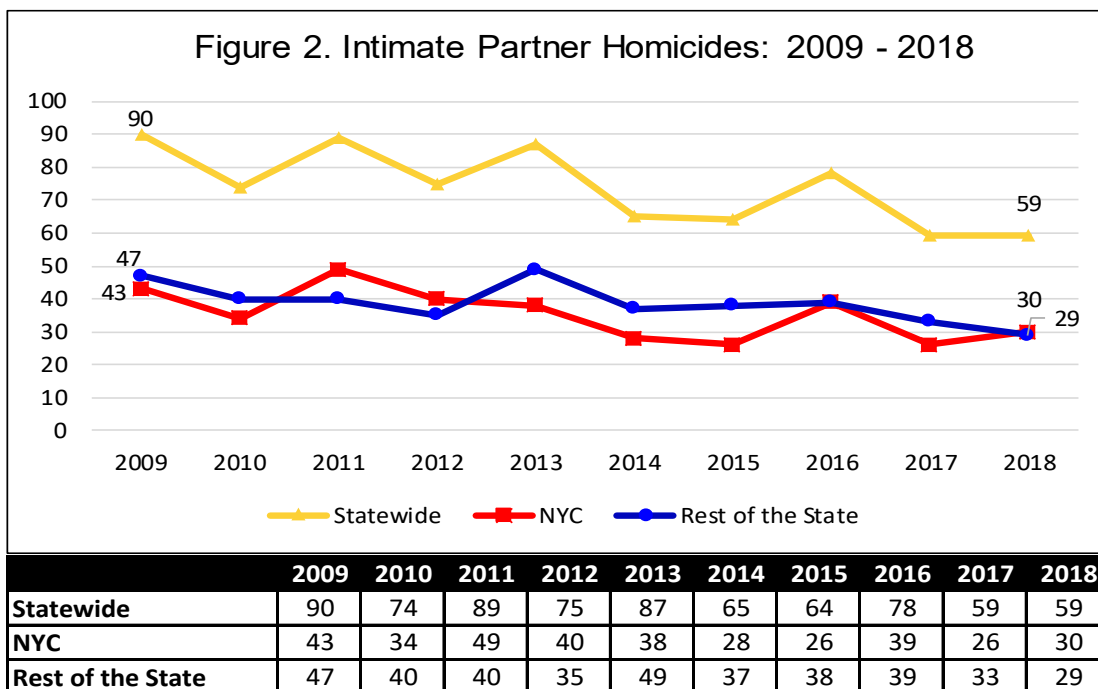
- Firearms were the most common weapon used in domestic homicides statewide (41 of 111) followed by a knife, cutting instrument or blunt object (35 of 111).
- Firearms were used in 41.7 percent of domestic homicides in the Rest of the State as compared to 31.4 percent (16) of domestic homicides in New York City.
- In New York City, a knife, cutting instrument or blunt object was the weapon used against 56.7 percent (17) of victims in intimate partner homicides. In contrast, a firearm was the weapon used in 58.6 percent (17) of intimate partner homicides in the Rest of the State.
- Among the 52 other family domestic homicides, 30.8 percent involved firearms; 28.8 percent involved personal weapons (hands, feet, teeth); and 21.2 percent involved knives, cutting instruments or blunt objects.

Trends in Domestic Homicide 2009 - 2018

This section compares domestic homicides annually for the 10-year period from 2009 through 2018.



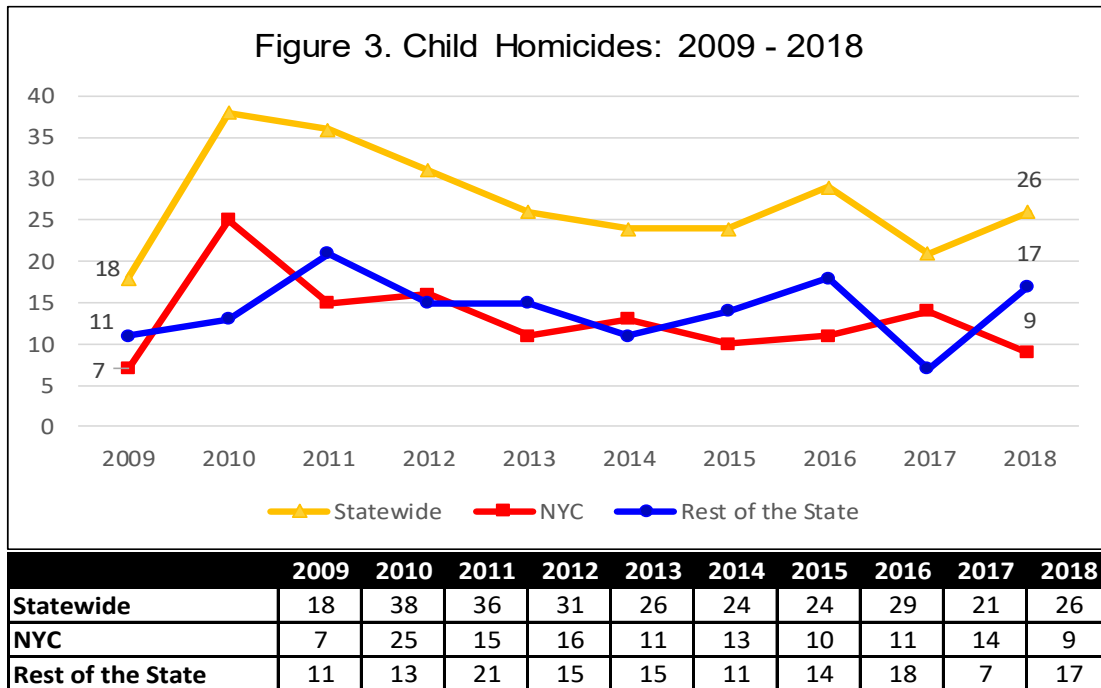
- Statewide, domestic homicides reached their highest point in 2011, with 171 and lowest point in 2017, with 108.
- New York City had the fewest domestic homicides in 2015, while the Rest of the State reported the fewest in 2014.



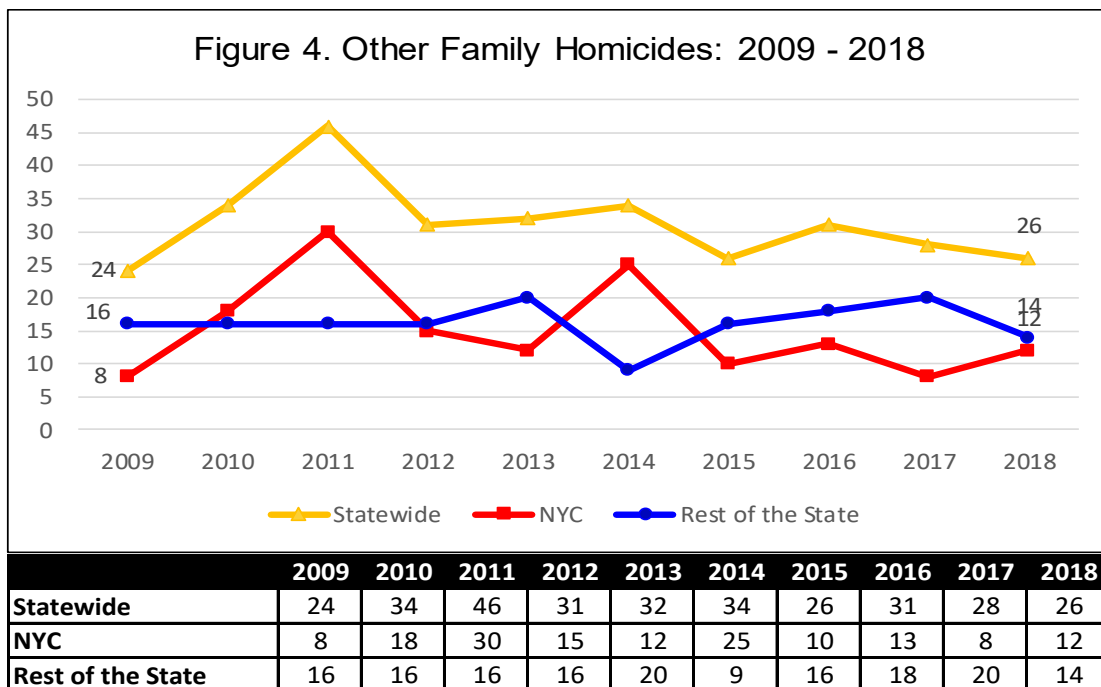
- The number of intimate partner homicides reported statewide in 2018 was 59, the same as reported in 2017. This is the lowest number reported since DCJS began publishing this report in 2008 (analyzing 2007 data).
- Intimate partner homicides in New York City reached a low of 26 twice (2015 and 2017); those homicides in the Rest of the State reached an all-time low of 29 in 2018.

Trends in Domestic Homicide 2009 - 2018

Figures 3 and 4 show child and other family homicides reported annually for the 10-year period from 2009 through 2018 by type of relationship.



- Statewide, child homicides increased by 23.8 percent from 2017 to 2018. The nine child homicides reported by New York City in 2018 was the second lowest since 2009. There were 17 child homicides reported in the Rest of the State during the same time frame, more than double the number reported in 2017.



- Other family homicides continue to fluctuate annually in New York City and the Rest of the State. In 2018, New York City reported 12 and the Rest of State 14.

The following counties with no homicides of any type reported in 2018 are excluded from the table: Cayuga, Franklin, Fulton, Hamilton, Herkimer, Jefferson, Lewis, Livingston, Orleans, Otsego, Putnam, Schuyler, Tioga and Tompkins. Eighteen other counties with no domestic homicides but at least one other homicide in 2018 — Allegany, Chautauqua, Chemung, Columbia, Essex, Genesee, Greene, Montgomery, Ontario, Oswego, Rockland, St. Lawrence, Schoharie, Steuben, Sullivan, Warren, Washington and Wyoming — are included.
